RALEIGH — Mrs. Dan K. Moore, North Carolina's First Lady, is serving as honorary chairman of a campaign beginning here Sunday to raise \$75,000 for a chapel here at the State Correctional Center for Women.

Mrs. Moore explains that the place of worship will be known as "The Chapel of the Nameless Woman". The appeal is being made during the Easter Season which, she points out, honors Christ. "It was He who extended a hand in love and compassion to the shamed woman taken by the angry mob... and in so doing, He transformed her into a beautiful Christian person."

"Through this proposed chapel we have an opportunity to help Christ again extend a hand in love and compassion... to lift the fallen, to bind up broken spirits, and to heal diseased souls," Mrs. Moore said.

Working with Mrs. Moore in directing the Holy Week appeal is a steering committee headed by Mrs. L. Y. Ballentine of Raleigh. Mrs. Amos N. Johnson of Garland and Mrs. Arthur Budenhagen of Raleigh are secretary and treasurer, respectively. Other members of the executive group are Dr. Rachel Davis of Winston-Salem.

Although word of the chapel fund appeal did not become public knowledge until now, money has already begun arriving from all over the United States. Mrs. Elizabeth McCubbin, superintendent at the Raleigh prison, says that Salisbury school children have staged a cake sale to help finance the chapel project. John Baker, professional football player of Raleigh, referred to the chapel undertaking in recent interviews with sportswriters... and gifts began arriving from a number of states.

The N. C. Federation of Women's Clubs is raising money from the sale of note paper. The Charlotte Quota Club has built a chapel model... with a coin slot in the roof... to receive contributions at its meetings. Methodist churchwomen at Millbrook are collecting scrap paper. 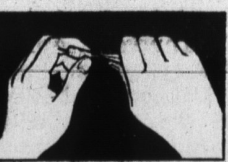
