

**RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KINGS MOUNTAIN, NORTH CAROLINA**

THAT WHEREAS, Sadie Cotton Mills Company has heretofore filed a Petition with The City Council of the City of Kings Mountain, North Carolina, requesting that such portions of East Gold Street, Kiser Street and Sadie Loop lying within the bounds of the property outlined in green upon the map attached to the Petition, be closed; and,

WHEREAS, it appears from said Petition and from other evidence that the Petitioner is the owner of all the lands adjoining the portions of said streets and that no other individual or corporation owns any portion of said adjoining lands; and that said streets are not under the control and supervision of the State Highway Commission; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 153-9 (17) of the General Statutes of North Carolina, notice of the consideration of the Petition by the Council was published once a week for four (4) weeks in The Kings Mountain Herald, a newspaper published weekly in Cleveland County, North Carolina; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to said notice duly given, a public meeting of the City Council of the City of Kings Mountain, North Carolina, was held on June 14, 1966, at the Kings Mountain City Hall to consider the request for the closing of portion of said streets, at which time no person or corporation appeared in opposition thereto; and,

WHEREAS, it appears to the satisfaction of the Council that the closing of the portions of said streets as set forth in the Petition and in the notice as aforesaid is not contrary to the public interest and that no individual, firm, or corporation

### NEW USE FOR OLD TABLE LEGS

"Imagination, plus patience and nimble fingers can do some very creative things," reminds Mrs. Martha B. Thompson, home economics extension agent, Davidson County. She backs up her statement with this story.

Mrs. T. S. Payne of the Reds Community spotted several discarded table legs and wanted to

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that pursuant to the authority contained in Section 153-9 (17) of the General Statutes of North Carolina, portions of the streets referred to above be and the same are hereby closed and withdrawn from public dedication, said portions of said streets being more particularly described as follows:

BEGINNING at a stake in the northwest margin of Sadie Loop as the same now exist, said stake being located in an easterly direction with the line of Sadie Loop 766.22 feet from the eastern margin of Oriental Avenue, and running thence North 47 deg. 00' East 124.78 feet to a point; thence 24 deg. 39' West 80.0 feet to a stake in the southern margin of East Gold Street; thence with the eastern margin of East Gold Street North 89 deg. 28' East 116.40 feet to a stake, the intersection of East Gold Street and Kiser Street; thence along the western margin of Kiser Street South 3 deg. 10' East 146.14 feet to a stake; thence South 85 deg. 56' West 182.82 feet to the beginning.

The above description was taken from a map prepared by Findlay, Withers, and McConaughy, Inc., Registered Surveyors, dated May, 1966, and entitled "Property of Sadie Cotton Mills Company".

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution duly adopted by the City Council of the City of Kings Mountain, North Carolina, at its regular meeting on June 14, 1966, be recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds for Cleveland County, North Carolina, together with a copy of the map attached to the Petition.

### PRESERVE FOOD TO STRETCH DOLLARS

As a way of stretching the food dollar, New Hanover county homemakers are striving for a total of 600 families to can blue ribbon products by the end of this year. "They know they will reach the mark," Verna Belle Lowery, home economics extension agent, states. "The interest in canning fruits and vegetables, pickling, and making jams and jellies has never been higher."

Many families are taking advantage of local products by going into the fields when they are open to the public and picking berries and gathering vegetables. Already, Miss Lowery's office has received 604 requests for help in canning foods.

### OPERATION DAY CAMP

Plans are being made for a Day Camp Program for culturally deprived children in Lincoln County, extension home economics agents report. The project will be sponsored jointly by

the Home Economics Extension Office and the Presbyterian Church.

### 4-H SUNDAY AIDS PROGRAM

New interest in 4-H Club work has grown out of the observance of 4-H Sunday. Carolyn B. Heavner, assistant home economics extension agent, Burke County, states.

The Hartland Road, Pax Hill, and Chesterfield 4-H Clubs presented a 4-H Sunday service in a community where there was no club.

At the end of the service, community members in the congregation expressed an interest in starting a club for youth in their community. "It would be good training for the youth in our church," they said.

### OLD-FASHIONED BONNET

During the cold winter months, Mrs. Jasper Breeze, Hurdle Mills, Rt. 1 developed a hobby—making a modern version of the old-fashioned bonnet.


