Cleveland's Conservation Needs Are Subject Of Current Study

Local employees of the U. S. Department of Agriculture are currently making a study of the conservation needs for Cleveland County.

Mr. Joe N. Craver, Work Unit Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service and Chairman of the County Conservation Needs Committee, reports that a study is underway to review the present use being made of the land in the County and the types of treatment needed to protect this land and improve it. Purpose of this study is to determine trends in use of land, to identify problem areas, to gather data on watersheds, and to determine treatment needs.

Information is being gathered from sample areas throughout the County. This information includes types and classes of soils, present use of the land; and in crops, the kind of crops being grown. Once the study of the sample area is complete, this information will be expanded to cover the entire County. At that time the County Conservation Needs Committee will review the data and make any necessary adjustments.

Mr. Craver reports that a similar study was made in 1959. At that time it was estimated that another study would not be needed for the next 10 or 12 years. Rapid changes in agriculture and urbanization of large areas has pointed out the need for an updated study at this time. The County Conservation Needs Committee is made up of one representative from each State and Federal Agricultural Agency located in the County. From time to time they will be calling on County Commissioners, City and County Managers and City and County Planning Boards for information pertaining to the watershed phase of the inventory, particularly as it pertains to the needs for water supply and water quality control.

WATERSHED DATA TO BE GATHERED

Information will be gathered on each watershed in the County. In addition to land use and treatment data, the need for flood prevention projects, community water supply systems and pollution control will be evaluated. This information will be made available to community groups and to city and county planning commissions.

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Teens Advised To Be Informed

RALEIGH—Teenagers attending 4-H Club Week at N. C. State University were advised to become better informed about the world situation. This challenge came from another teenager, petite 17-year-old Cynthia Byrum, runner-up to the 1966 Miss Teenage America.

The Charlotte teenager pointed out that "in a few more years our generation will be making important decisions." We need to settle down and think about how we can improve the United States and make it a better place to live, she believes. Miss Byrum and three other young women are spending an exciting year as youth safety spokesmen for Lincoln-Mercury. Among their duties, they are to travel all over the United States, speaking to thousands of teenagers and adults about the value of safe driving. The 1966 high school graduate indicated she missed about a month and a half of school while she participated in the contest and made speaking engagements. But she still managed to keep her school work up to date.

Any girl interested in entering the Miss Teenage America contest will do well to have the consent of her parents, Miss Byrum believes. Her mother accompanied her on speaking engagements and has been most understanding, she indicated. Her father and her 21-year-old brother, who encouraged her to enter the contest, have offered their moral support.

Her youngest brother, a one and a half year old, is indifferent about the whole thing. For being first runner-up Miss Byrum won a \$4,000 scholarship which she will use to attend Eastman School of Music, Rochester, N. Y. She plans to study voice preparing for a career in opera or on Broadway.

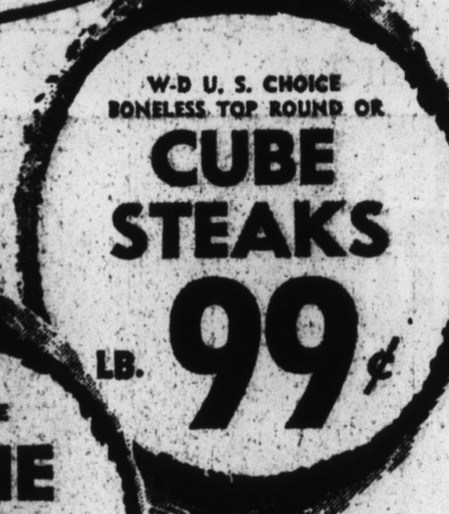
