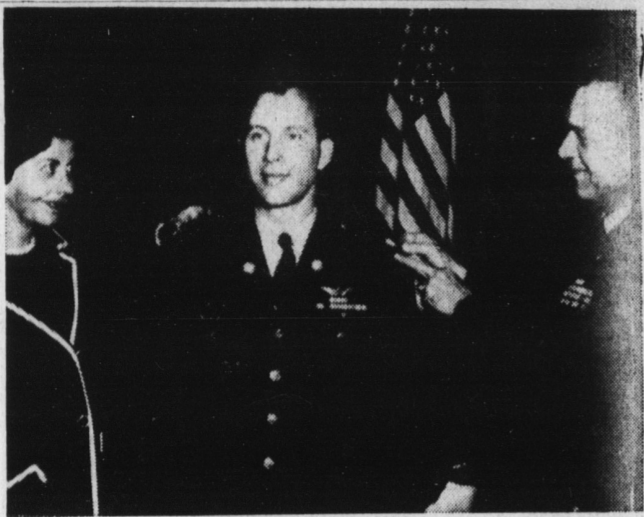

Son of Mrs. Margaret Roark of Shelby and the late James A. Roark of Grover, Mr. Roark is a former Shelby newspaper, having served as editor of the Cleveland Times. Chairman of Cleveland Association of Governmental Officials in 1967, he has been secretary-treasurer of Burger Barn Corporation since 1965. Associated with Pilot Life Insurance Company of Shelby, he is president of Cleveland Foods, Inc. of Shelby which operates five burger barns in the area. He has been active in the American Legion for 20 years, served during World War 11 on combat duty with the Eighth Air Force in Europe. He is a member of Shelby Presbyterian church and a charter member of the Shelby Civilian Club. Mrs. Roark is the former Dorothy Mulder of Holland, Michigan. They are parents of two children, Pamela, age 10, and Jeff, age seven.

The veteran Shelby alderman and former mayor pro tem, Wednesday issued this announcement: "Before election day, I will present fully and clearly my purpose in seeking this high and responsible office. 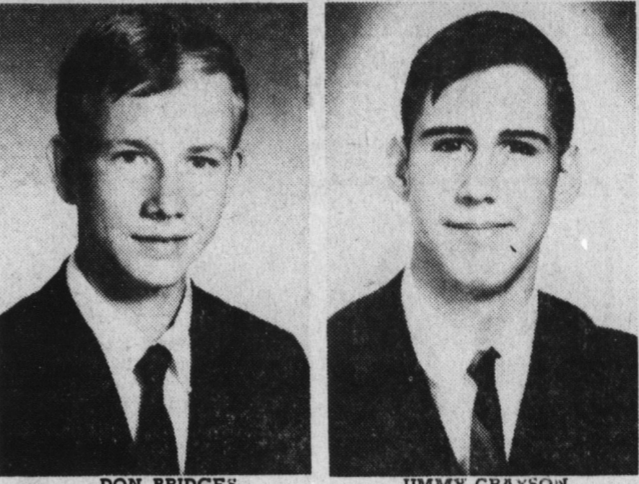

Emory Official To Fill Pulpit

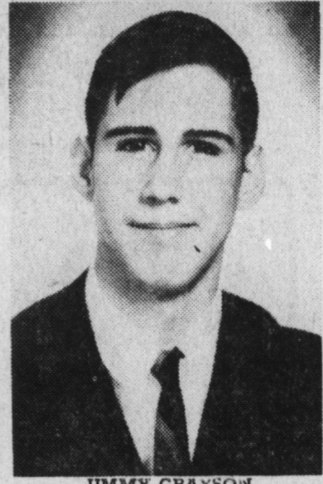
