Rev. Whittecar To Fill Lutheran Pulpit Sunday

Dr. George R. Whittecar, president of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, will fill the pulpit at the 11 o'clock morning worship service Sunday at St. Matthew's Lutheran church.

Prior to coming to the N. C. Synod January 1, 1963, he served as editor of the Kansas Synod Lutheran. He has held pastorates in Beloit, Kansas, Tulsa, Oklahoma and from 1951-62 was pastor of Concord's St. James church.

He is a graduate of Midland college and Western Theological Seminary. He was ordained by the Lutheran Synod of Kansas and Adjacent States in 1935.

He has also held important positions in the North Carolina Synod: member of the Board of Trustees of Lenoir Rhyne College, 1950-62; member of the Social Missions Committee of synod; member of the Board of Social Missions, United Lutheran Church in America, 1950-62; member of the Board of managers of the department of evangelism, National Council of the Churches of Christ, U.S.A., 1952-60. He was a delegate to six conventions of the ULCA, and a delegate to the constituting convention of the Lutheran Church in America, held in Detroit Michigan, in June, 1962. He was a member of the Board of Social Ministry of the Lutheran Church in America.

While serving as pastor of St. James' Concord, he was President of the Cabarrus County Lutheran Ministers' Association, 1954 and again in 1962.

He has represented the synod in the North Carolina Council of Churches. He served as first vice president of the Council, 1960-61, and was elected president at the annual meeting of the Council held in Winston-Salem, January, 1963, and served for two years.

He was married in 1936 to the former Ruth Livers, and they have four children.

Blanton Heads Mall Committee

Shareholders of Kings Mountain Mall, Inc. Tuesday elected 12 directors and first action of the corporation was to re-elect officers and appoint a four-man executive committee with Charles Blanton as chairman.

Paul H. McGinnis, corporation president since the group was formed last year, was re-elected president. Also re-elected was Bill H. Brown, vice-president. Elected secretary was Joe R. Smith, who served as treasurer during 1967, and elected treasurer was Lee McIntyre. First Citizens executive committee are L. E. Hinnant, Glee E. Bridges, and Wilson Griffin. Other directors are C. J. Mabry, Jr., Carl F. Mauney, W. S. Fulton, Jr. and Menzel Phifer.

In other actions, directors at the annual meeting voted to schedule a meeting with Mayor John H. Moss to determine how mall planning can be coordinated with city planning and the city's request for urban renewal and make an extended effort to obtain two options still outstanding on parcels of land within the proposed mall area.

Enrolling of abutting property owners into the corporation will be among duties of the newly-formed executive committee. By-law amendments approved in January paved the way for lease holders on property abutting the proposed mall area to become members of the corporation. President McGinnis explained in making the executive committee appointments.

The proposed Cherokee Street Mall would provide 400 free parking spaces with shops fronting on the parking area.

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Candidate White Issues Statement

Senator Jack White, who announced several weeks ago he would be a candidate for re-election, today announced a formal statement of candidacy.

He said: "I solicit the support of the voters in the Democratic Primary from Cleveland and Gaston Counties in order that I might further pursue some of the needs and problems of the people of this district and this state. Even though the state has progressed rapidly in public and higher education, there is still a great deal to be done in order to offer the young people of today a quality education.

"North Carolina has just touched the surface in the realistic needs of Mental Health and Alcohol rehabilitation. There is a tremendous need for facilities, teachers and doctors for our mentally retarded and for those who require special education.

"All local governmental units are suffering from 'growing pains' which growing pains are reflected in the demands for more services on the part of these local government agencies. Services cost money and these costs are ultimately born by the individual taxpayers. I sincerely hope that the Local Government Study Commission, of which I am a member, can recommend to the 1969 General Assembly, certain constitutional changes and other recommendations that will allow Local Government Agencies to continue to grow in an orderly fashion without any undue increase in ad valorem taxes on the individual taxpayer.

North Carolina is rapidly changing from a rural to an urban state, but we must be careful and prepared to make this change in an orderly fashion with the knowledge that the rural people are a vital part of N. C. and its progress.

These are just some of the problems that need careful consideration by the 1969 General Assembly. If the voters see fit to re elect me to a third term in the N. C. State Senate, I promise to give proper attention to these problems."

Two-term State Senator White, 42, served at the 1967 General Assembly session as chairman of the Senate committee on counties, cities and towns, as vice chairman of the committees on judiciary (2) and salaries and fees. He also was a member of nine other committees.

An attorney with the law firm of Davis, White and Short, the Kings Mountain man is currently serving as co-chairman of the Local Government Study Commission appointed to explore the needs and problems of all aspects of local government.

Mrs. White, the former Dorcas Cline of Fallston, is a Kings Mountain teacher. They and their three children reside on Edgemont Drive.

Group To Confer On Cansler Plan

The city board of commissioners took under advisement a request by Everette (Buddy) Medlin Tuesday night that the board go on record as opposing the Cansler street improvement project.

Mr. Medlin said he represented a group of citizens on Cansler street but did not name them. On motion of the board, Mayor John Henry Moss appointed a committee including Commissions W. S. Biddix, O. O. Walker, Norman King and City Attorney Jack White to confer with Mr. Medlin and his associates concerning the project.

Meantime, Mayor Moss explained that the Cansler street widening was one piece of the long-term city thoroughfare plan.

He also said he knew nothing of any plans, if any, to re-route NC 216 (now on Piedmont avenue and Railroad avenue) to Cansler street.
