A family party was held at the home of his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Oliver. David's decorated birthday cake was cut and served with party refreshments.

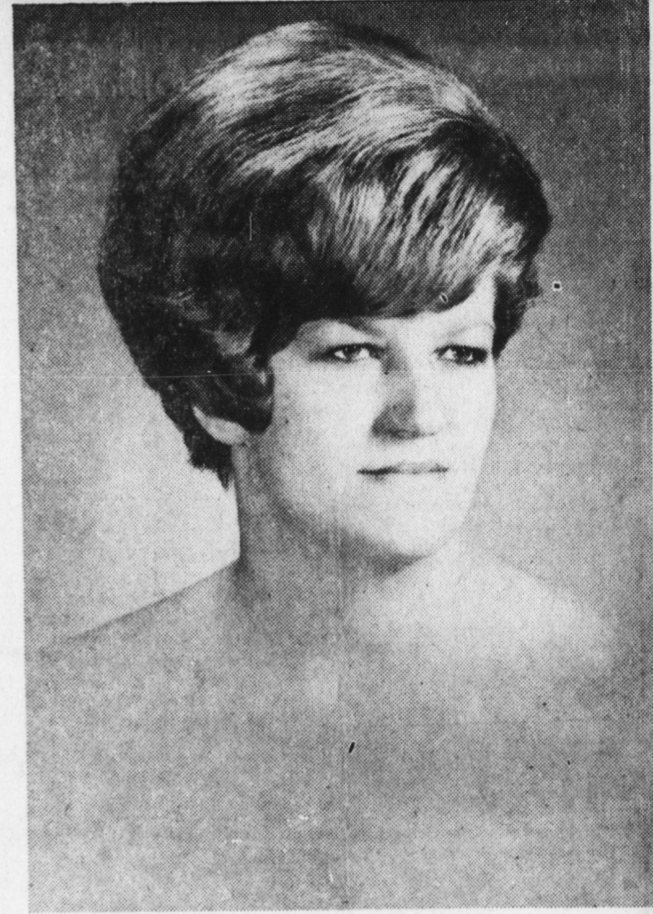

No Opposition Because I'm A Woman Mrs. Harper Says After Month Campaign

SOUTHPORT — Mrs. Margaret Harper, first woman candidate for Lt. Governor of North Carolina, said this week that during her first month on the campaign trail, she has encountered no opposition that appears to be based upon the fact that she is a woman. "Strangely enough," she said, "some of my most substantial support has come from men." "There appears to be more interest in the things I stand for and what I propose should be done about them," she explained. "When I tell those I meet that I am greatly interested in education, they want to know where I would propose to get the money with which to raise teacher pay, and if I would favor an increase in taxes." "My answer to the pair of questions is that I do not favor an increase in taxes. I believe that the tax base for the State of North Carolina will support any projected demands without the necessity for new taxes." "Usually someone comes up with the question of how do I feel about the responsibility of appointing committees for the State Senate. I tell them that I would be in the best position possible to make committee assignments, because I will not have made a single commitment prior to my election." (Continued on Page Two)
