The Veterans Corner

Q—I was retired from service for a disability and now the VA has awarded me compensation. Can I draw both?

A—Only if your retired pay is the greater benefit and you waive that is give up, an amount equal to your disability compensation.

Q—If I attend school half-time for six months in an institution of higher learning, how much of my eligibility to G. I. Bill education and training benefits will be charged against me?

A—Three months of your eligibility will be charged against you.

Q—I served for two years in the Army from April 1955 to March 1967. Am I entitled to hospitalization benefits from the Veterans Administration?

A—Yes. But if it is not for a service-connected disability, hospital care from the VA is on a bed-available basis. The veteran must also affirm his inability to defray the cost of hospitalization.

Q—May I borrow on my G. I. insurance to help pay college expenses for my son? How much may I borrow?

A—If you have a permanent Major G. I. insurance policy you may borrow up to 99 percent of the cash value of that policy. The interest charge on this loan is 4 percent.
