Bid Imbalance Solution Sought

Mayor John Henry Moss and J. L. Williams and William Goladay of J. L. Williams Associates, were conferring in Atlanta Wednesday afternoon with regional officials of the Department of Housing and Urban Development on means of proceeding with the projected neighborhood facilities building.

Anticipated initially to cost \$424,000, with the federal government already having approved a grant of \$302,680, the building, on basis of low bids received June 19, would cost \$608,000.

Nominally, the federal government provides two-thirds of the cost, the local government one-third.

Power Demand Sets Record

The city logged its peak power load late Wednesday morning. Hunter Allen, veteran electrical superintendent, said the reading was 6700 kilowatts, exceeding considerably the previous peak demand of 6336 kilowatts recorded in December 1967.

Demand at the comparable date a year ago was 5472 kilowatts.

Supt. Allen recalls that the peak in 1931, when he joined the city electrical department, was 200 kilowatts.

"That air-conditioning pulls it in weather like this," Supt. Allen commented.

In the letter of petition, the owners said they anticipated development of the properties commercially. The two lots approximate 160 feet on Mountain and are approximately 160 feet deep.

The board authorized the Mayor to obtain informal bids and purchase a lawn mower for the recreation department.

WE THINK IT'S EXCUSABLE TO EXAGGERATE when you have occasion to give someone a series of numerals, such as a phone number, over the telephone. A missed numeral, unlike a missed word, can't be deduced from context. So we recommend the following arbitrary pronunciation of numerals:

- 0 — "OH" — be careful not to end it with "ER" or to confuse it with "4"
- 1 — "WUN" — sound the "W" and "N"
- 2 — "TOO" — sound the "T" and prolong the "OO"
- 3 — "THREE" — roll "R" once and prolong the "EE"
- 4 — "FOUR" — don't confuse it with "O"
- 5 — "FIVE" — long "I" and strong "V" — don't confuse it with "9"
- 6 — "SIX" — stress the "KS"
- 7 — "SEVEN" — hold the "VEN"
- 8 — "ATE" — be sure to sound the "T"
- 9 — "NI-EN" — don't confuse it with "5"
