McGill Joins Breeder Group

John C. McGill of Kings Mountain has been accepted for membership in the American-International Charolais Assn., Houston, the nation's fourth largest and fastest-growing beef breed, announced J. Scott Henderson, executive secretary.

Originating in France more than 200 years ago, Charolais has become well established in this country because of the breed's greater weight-for-age, greater feeding efficiency and improved carcass values that produce a greater ratio of quality lean meat to fat than other breeds.

Registrations of purebred Charolais during the past year totaled 17,618 animals, a 46% increase above year earlier figures. Transfers rose 41% as more and more breeders enter the production picture. Membership increased to 5,676 members, a 34% increase over new members the previous year.

There are now approximately 59,900 purebred and 183,183 recorded animals in the association's herd book and appendix, for a national herd of 243,088 animals.

Nazarenes Name Delegates

At Nazarene district assemblies during this month, reports will be made by those who were delegates to the denomination's 17th quadrennial General Assembly which was attended by a record 35,000 persons in Kansas City, Mo., June 13-21.

The theme for the 1968-72 quadrennium was intended as a capsule of the Christian philosophy for the hour: "These times... God is able!"

In five swift ballots the 680 delegates elected three new general superintendents: Dr. Edward Lawlor, secretary of evangelism; Dr. Eugene Stowe, president of Nazarene Theological Seminary; and Dr. Orville W. Jenkins, secretary of home missions.

Three general superintendents re-elected were: Dr. Samuel Young, Dr. V. H. Lewis and Dr. George Coulter. All six of the general superintendents reside in Kansas City, Mo.

Delegates also re-elected: Dr. John L. Stockton, general treasurer; Dr. W. T. Purkiser, editor of the Herald of Holiness; and Dr. B. Edgar Johnson, general secretary.

Dr. Lewis, in presenting the quadrennial message of the

Board of General Superintendents, asked Nazarenes to raise \$30,000,000 for world missions in 1968-72. This would represent an increase of nearly \$6,000,000 over the record sum of \$23,729,000 raised for world missions in 1964-68.

Other goals for the next four years: 400 new churches, net gain of 70,000 members, gain in Sunday school enrollment to 1,100,000 persons.
