\$1 Million By Burlington To Education

The Aid to Education program administered by the Burlington Industries Foundation provided over \$1 million in financial assistance during the past school year. In the last decade, Foundation grants and loans have exceeded \$6.5 million.

In all phases of the program this year, corporate grants for educational purposes amounted to \$1,012,826 and benefited over 500 schools, according to W. S. Markham Jr., executive director of the Foundation.

Direct grants totaling \$528,165 were made to 74 institutions in 15 states. Under the matching phases of the program, \$213,729 was distributed to over 300 schools. Employee gifts to educational institutions, tuition grants and scholarships were matched in this area by Burlington.

Children of employees have received over 330 educational loans exceeding \$31,000. These students attended 129 colleges in 17 states.

In states where Burlington plants are located, the Foundation makes grants to state associations of private colleges, the United Negro College Fund and similar organizations promoting higher education. These grants annually exceed \$100,000.
