**STUFFED CABBAGE CASSEROLE**

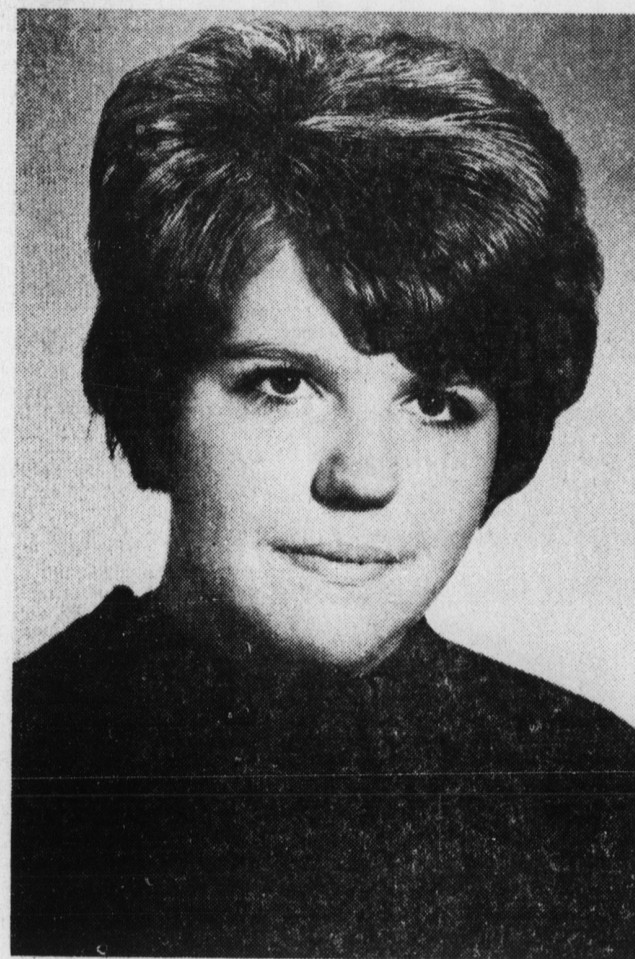
1/2 cup rice  
1/2 lb. bacon, diced  
2 large onions, chopped  
1 1/2 pounds ground beef  
1/2 cup A.I. Sauce  
2 cans (8 oz. each) tomato sauce  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 medium sized head cabbage

Cook rice in boiling water 5 minutes. Drain rice; reserve. Sauté bacon until just tender; drain off drippings, reserving 2 tsp. drippings. Cook onions in 2 tsp. drippings until tender. Combine rice, bacon, onions, beef, 1/4 cup A.I. sauce and 1 can tomato sauce; mix well. Remove core from cabbage. Dip cabbage into boiling water until leaves separate easily. Remove leaves carefully to retain shape. Spoon meat mixture into centers of leaves. Fold around meat; place cabbage rolls seam side down in 8 quart baking dish. Mix remaining A.I. sauce and tomato sauce; pour over cabbage rolls. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F) about 3 1/2 hours. Makes eight servings.

## Oratorio Singers To Give Concert On January 25th

The Oratorio Singers of Charlotte will present the first of their two annual concerts Saturday, January 25th, at 8:15 in the Owens Auditorium.

The chorus and its 35-piece orchestra, conducted by Donald Platt, chairman of the Davidson College Music Department, will perform George Friedrich Handel's oratorio "Israel in Egypt."

The performance will feature four guest soloists, two of them whom have sung with the Oratorio Singers in previous concerts, and include, Soprano —

James Harsanyi, featured artist with the Princeton Chamber Orchestra, which her husband conducts, a member of the Bach Aria Group. She appeared with the Singers in the Bach "B Minor Mass," LAST YEAR.

Tenor — Henry Nason, a specialist in the works of Bach and Handel, who also performed in the "B Minor Mass" last year.

Baritone — James Berry, Minister of Music at Myers Park Baptist Church and graduate of Westminster Choir College. He has performed previously with the Singers.

Contralto — Louise Parker, who has appeared as a soloist with the Vienna Philharmonic, with Leopold Stokowski at Carnegie Hall, and with the New York Philharmonic four times. She is internationally known singer has twice received the Marian Anderson Award.

In addition to the featured soloists, two Oratorio members will also have solo parts. They are Miriam Booth, who will join Mrs. Harsanyi in a duet, "The Lord is My Strength," and Weldon Foard, who will sing a duet for bass with Berry. Both Mrs. Booth and Foard have made solo appearances in the area.

Though much of Handel's music is of a religious nature, he was primarily a dramatic rather than a religious composer. Much of the dramatic impact in "Israel in Egypt" comes from his use of short, powerful motifs, which stir the listener without requiring concentration necessary in the longer and more complicated works of Bach or Beethoven.

This oratorio differs from many others in that the chorus is the protagonist. The soloists serve primarily as spokesmen for the group.

Since the oratorio is a drama without scenery or action, it is up to the chorus and orchestra to carry the drama to the audience. It is here that Handel shows his genius in "Israel in Egypt." The orchestra, chorus, and soloists present a series of most vivid musical pictures.

There are still subscriptions available for both performances. Tickets for the single concert are \$3.75, \$3.00, and \$2.50. Special student rates are \$1.00 less in each section.
