Mrs. Blanton Wins Five-Year Scouting Pin, Two Girl Scout Troops Among 10 Tapped

Mrs. Charles D. Blanton, local Girl Scout leader, was presented a five-year service pin in the Pioneer Girl Scout Council at the annual meeting of the Council Saturday.

The Kings Mountain woman was also elected a member-at-large in the council to serve a two-year term. Other members-at-large include Mrs. James Scruggs of Grover.

A highlight of the meeting was the presentation to 10 troops of the Piper Banner by Council Piper Mrs. Edwin Starr. Of the 10 among 170 troops in the Council which qualified for the honor two were from Kings Mountain: Troop 4 Cadettes of which Mrs. Raymond Holmes is leader and Troop 155 Juniors of which Mrs. Robert Davis is leader. The following criteria had to be met by a troop between January 1 and December 31, 1968, to achieve banner status: have at least 20 Brownies or 28 Juniors or Cadettes or 24 Seniors; be a wide-range open-end troop; have a minimum of three registered troop committee members; have a signed sponsorship agreement dated 1968 with a copy on file with neighborhood chairman; carry out a special service project and report on it; participate in a troop camping experience and report on it; have bridging activity with sister troop and report on it; and register on time. With 170 troops in the Council, only 10 qualified.

Mrs. Blanton, chairman of the public relations committee for the council, presented the program. She first outlined some of

the work that is being done toward the development of the new Pioneer Scout camp site in Golden Valley, announcing that a capital funds drive for this purpose is planned for 1970. She then gave a premier showing of colored slides with commentary which will soon be made into a filmstrip entitled, "A Time To Measure" which gives very graphically the values to be gained from Girl Scouting in general and from Girl Scout camping in particular. This film strip with commentary has been put together by Mrs. Blanton. She concluded her program by challenging all leaders and troops to share the job of public relations for Girl Scouting, and the new camp with her.

David Lowry To Give Organ Recital In Gastonia Monday Night At 8 p.m.

The Gastonia Chapter of the American Guild of Organists will present David Lowry in organ recital Monday night, January 27th, at 8 p.m. in Gastonia's First Presbyterian church.

Mr. Lowry's program will include the prelude, "Fugue and Chaconne in D Minor" by Johann Pachelbel; "Adam fut un pauvre homme" by Jean-Francois Dandrieu; "Fantasia in F Minor" by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart; "Wondrous Love" by Samuel Barber; and Four Chorales from "Orgelbuchlein" by Johann Sebastian Bach.

David Lowry is Winthrop College Organist and Assistant Professor of Music in the Winthrop College School of Music, Rock Hill, S. C. Since coming to Winthrop in 1955, he has appeared throughout the state in workshops and lectures concerning Music in the Contemporary Church.

His recital appearances have included numerous engagements in chapters of the American Guild of Organists; an appear-

ance on the famed Lenten Series of St. Thomas Church, New York; Church of the Heavenly Rest, New York; the Huntington Hartford Gallery of Modern Art; and many college campuses.

At Winthrop College, he is the College Organist, an assistant professor in service playing organ literature, and the conductor of the Winthrop Chorus.

He is currently Dean of the Charlotte Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. His training was received at Baldwin-Wallace College and Union Theological Seminary. Prior to coming to his position at Winthrop, he was assistant organist-choirmaster at the Church of the Heavenly Rest, New York. In the summer of 1967, Lowry was an active participant in the Summer Academy for Organists in Haarlem, Holland, studying literature with Anton Heiller and improvisation with Cor Kee.

Finding himself discontent with only teaching and lecturing on music in the Church, he also finds (Continued on Page Two)

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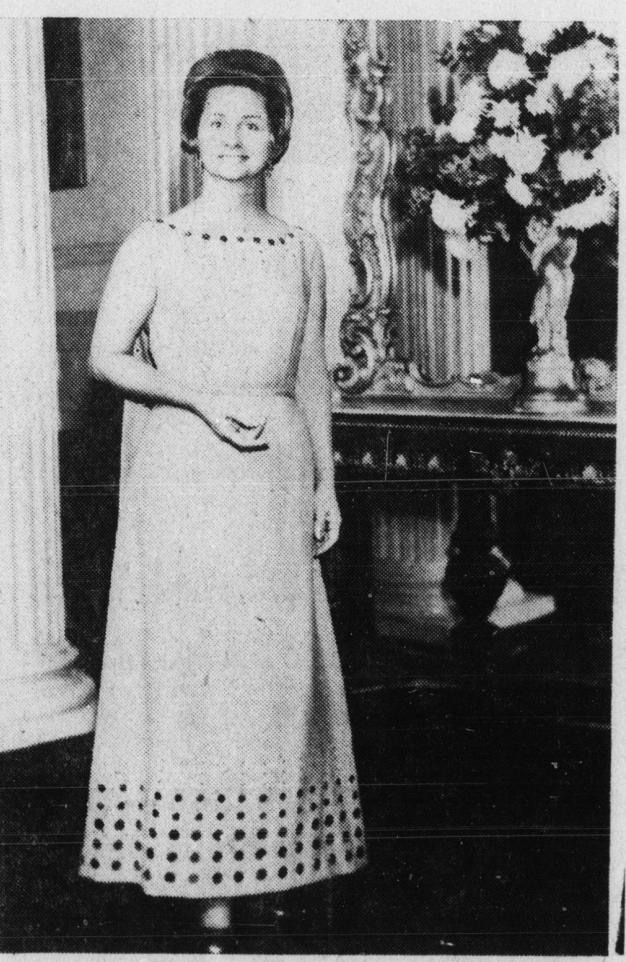

'Raescott' For N. C. First Lady

Mrs. Robert Scott, wife of North Carolina's Governor Bob Scott, is shown here in the all-North Carolina gown she wore to the week-end presidential inaugural ball in Washington.

The gown is made of a new man-made fiber not yet on the market. It is 100 per cent Dacron Polyester, spun in DuPont's Kinston plant, and woven at Glen Raven Mills in Eumsville. The fabric, especially made for Mrs. Scott's gown, was designed by Annie Hassell of Burnsville. The dyeing and finishing was supervised by John Coleman. Only 20 yards of the material have been manufactured.

The gown itself, made by the Domacost Company of Rutherfordton, was designed by J. Faulton Hodge. It features a boat neckline, fitted bodice, and slightly flared A-line skirt. A detail of self-trim is at the waistline and a panel of self material falls from the shoulders. An intricate pattern of mica books in graduating circles accent the hemline and the panel of the dress. A small inverted replica of the mica design at the neckline is accented with flakes of amethyst. The mica was provided by William Wilkins of the Deneen Mica Co. of Newdale, N. C. and the amethysts were given by Mrs. Margaret Newbert of Asheville. Jim Tow, an Asheville goldsmith, designed and gave the large garnet earrings. The fabric is now being introduced to the market under the name Raescott, honoring Mrs. Scott, whose own name is Jessie Rae Scott. J. Faulton Hodge, designer of the dress, originated the name.
