Dial Tone Longer Wait In Bad Weather

Have you ever wondered why it is that almost every time it snows you have to wait longer to get dial tone on your telephone?

R. B. Moore, manager for Southern Bell, says this question has been asked by a number of people lately.

"First, and I suppose most important, is the fact that this is basically the economics of operating a telephone system and furnishing high quality telephone services at a reasonable cost to the customer," Moore said.

"Central office equipment is extremely expensive to purchase and to maintain. We know how much is needed to handle one of our normal busier days, so our offices are equipped sufficiently to handle this load, and then we add some for growth. This holds our investment and operating costs as low as possible consistent with furnishing adequate, efficient and quality telephone service at rates our customers can afford."

"Then it snows and our normal busy day is no longer normal," Moore said. "Everyone becomes interested in calling everyone else (sometimes just to tell them it's snowing) and there is simply not enough equipment to handle every call at one time. Consequently someone has to wait until a call is completed and equipment in the central office is released."

Many emergency situations are created by slick roads, traffic jams and automobile accidents. People stranded are anxious to get in touch with their families and advise them of their situation. Unable to get out to meet commitments, meetings have to be cancelled, members notified and rearrangements made. This, of course, did not deter the normal desire to call a friend and just chat awhile.

Obviously this emergency condition creates an abnormal demand on the telephone central office, he said.

What should you do if you pick up the telephone and do not immediately receive dial tone?

Moore said to just hold your telephone off the hook for a few minutes. If you hang up you lose your "place in line" so to speak. As soon as equipment is available in the central office to handle your call you will receive dial tone.

"Let me urge you to please be patient in these cases," Moore said. "When you get dial tone go ahead and make your call. Of course, it would help the next person if your call is brief - his may be an emergency. Reporting your telephone to repair service when this situation exists only helps to compound the problem, since we know what is happening, and this creates one more additional call."

Women's Health

RALEIGH — If you're counting calories, be sure to count the nutritive values of the foods you eat too.

For you need more than "food energy" for your meals, reminds Mrs. Marjorie Donnelly, extension food specialist, North Carolina State University. You need plenty of vitamins, minerals and proteins to keep you in good health while you're counting calories and afterwards too.

Before you go on a diet, talk with your physician, Mrs. Donnelly advises. He can give you some guidelines on the safe way to cut calories without cutting vitamins and other nutrients.

One sound approach is to select foods from these four food groups: meats, milk, breads and cereals and fruits and vegetables. That way you can select foods from the family's meals without fixing something different for the dieter.

Your goal, the specialist points out, is to regulate your eating habits so the total calories eaten are less than your daily calorie needs.

This doesn't always mean cutting out the foods you usually eat, Mrs. Donnelly observes.

When you choose a variety of foods from each of the four food groups, and use the number of servings recommended you can be sure of getting the nutrients you need.

The way to prepare and serve food can make a difference. Fried foods and salad dressings add calories. But without much effort, you can eliminate calorie boosters, such as fat on meat, rich sauces, gravies and rich desserts.

Set a goal and plan carefully how you're going to reach it, Mrs. Donnelly suggests. Don't rely on crash diets or pills unless your physician recommends them.

By choosing good foods wisely you'll probably find you don't have to starve yourself to weight, the specialist states.
