### THE VETERAN'S CORNER

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on veterans benefits may be obtained at any VA office.

**Q**—I have a National Service Life Insurance policy that has been in force as an Ordinary Life Plan since 1945. My children are now grown and I am thinking about discontinuing the payment of premiums and taking a paid-up policy. If I do, will my dividends be discontinued?

**A**—No, but they will not be as large as your own existing policy. If you take a paid-up policy, the amount of insurance in force will be less than the present face value of your policy. The dividends will be computed on this reduced insurance coverage.

**Q**—I recently completed three years service in the Army. If I go back to school under the G. I. Bill, will I be permitted to work and still be eligible for the educational assistance allowance from the Veterans Administration?

**A**—Yes. The amount of G. I. Bill educational assistance allowance paid by VA is determined only by the amount of schooling or training a veteran receives (full-time courses, half-time, quarter-time) and his number of dependents. Whether he works or has other income has no effect on this allowance. Of course, the veteran's school schedule, that is whether he can carry full-time courses, may be affected by an outside job.

**Q**—My daughter is receiving a monthly pension of \$49 from the Veterans Administration because of the death of her father, a World War II veteran. She is a student in college. She plans to work this summer and her earnings, plus her Social Security, will exceed \$1,800. Will this bar her from receiving the VA pension?

**A**—No. In the case of a child receiving a pension, earned income is not considered for income limitation purposes. Since her income, less her earned income, will be under \$1,800, her pension will not be affected.

### AT&T Stock Up Slightly

American Telephone & Telegraph Company reported Wednesday net income applicable to AT&T stock was \$2,052 billion in 1968, up slightly from \$2,049 billion in 1967.

Earnings per share were \$3.75, down from \$3.79 a share for 1967.

The 1968 earnings figure is based on an average of 54.67 million shares outstanding, compared with an average of 54.03 million in 1967.

Revenue of AT&T and its telephone subsidiaries were \$14.1 billion for 1968, an increase of 8.4 per cent over the 1967 figure of \$13 billion.

The Bell System spent a record \$1.7 billion on building new facilities during the year, up from \$1.3 billion in 1967.

To help finance this program, more than \$1.5 billion in new capital was raised during 1968, mainly from the sale of debt issues, said F. B. Houck, District Manager for Southern Bell Telephone Company.

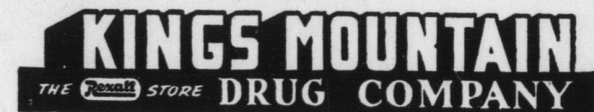

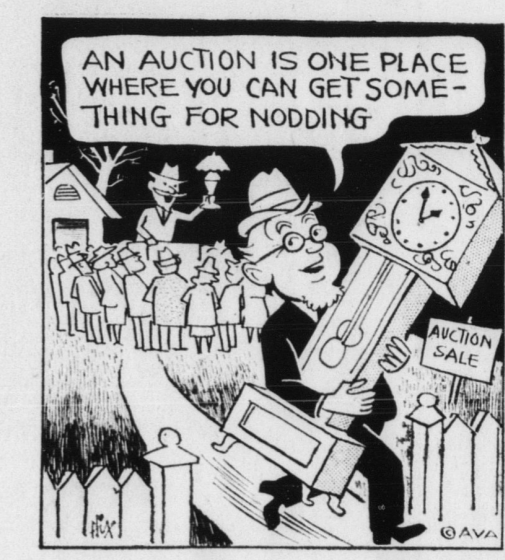

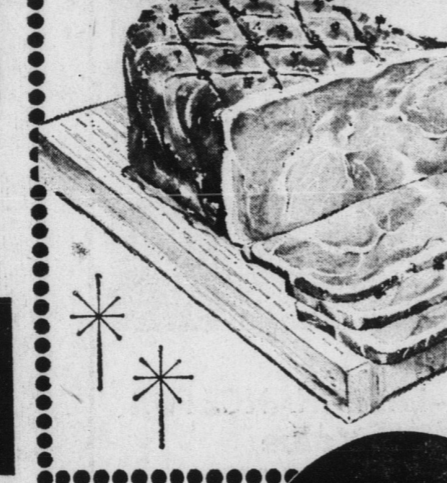
