

Itemize Gifts On Tax Return

GREENSBORO, N. C. — Failure of some taxpayers to substantiate their charitable contributions caused the loss of all or part of the amount they claimed as a deduction last year.

Substantiation of charitable contributions is one of the most frequent problems encountered in the audit of tax returns, J. E. Wall, District Director of Internal Revenue, reminded North Carolina taxpayers today.

HOME FIRE DRILLS

New York (WMNS) — School fire drills are taken for granted but fire is 200 times more likely to break out in your home.

First step in remedying this situation, say fire authorities, is a family council. Children should be warned that the major danger is not the flames but accompanying deadly gases and smoke. A speedy escape is essential. There is never time to gather up favorite belongings or pets.

Since most fires break out between midnight and six a.m., bedroom doors should be closed every night to help protect sleepers. Each bedroom should have two planned escape routes. In case of fire, test the door before opening it. If it is warm to the touch, use the alternate escape route.

To prevent the inhalation of suffocating gases, you should try to cover your nose and mouth with a pillow or wet cloth. Crouch as you run because the air near the floor is cooler and cleaner.

CONSOLATION FOR CITY-DWELLERS

Higher Checks For Veterans

Nearly two million veterans with service-connected disabilities received higher compensation checks this week from the Veterans Administration, according to W. R. Phillips, Manager of the North Carolina VA Regional Office.

Some 115,000 veterans with 100 per cent disabilities received an increase in their basic compensation from \$300 to \$400 a month.

For approximately 1,849,000 veterans rated 10 to 90 per cent disabled, the increase averaged about eight per cent, Phillips said.

Those with 10 per cent disabilities have had their compensation increased from \$21 to \$23 a month; veterans rated 20 to 30 per cent service-disabled now receive payments ranging from \$43 to \$226 monthly.

The checks now being received are for the higher rates that went into effect January 1.

Not increased, however, are the extra allowances payable for dependents of veterans rated 50 per cent or more service-disabled.

Veterans seeking more information on their disability payments were urged to contact their nearest VA office.

Burlington Report Gives Record Of Highlights Of Busy 1968

Wilmington, Del. — Sales for Burlington Industries in the current quarter are running nine per cent ahead of the same period last year, shareholders were told at the diversified textile company's annual meeting here today.

Charles F. Myers Jr., chairman and chief executive of Burlington, said that various efforts to "cool the economy in 1969 are expected to have an effect, but the extent to which consumer spending may be curtailed is unknown. We have noticed signs of slackening business in some areas recently, which may indicate that the growth rate of consumer demand is slowing somewhat. However, Mr. Myers stated, "Burlington's own plans are made on a long-range basis with the firm belief that demand for textiles and related products will continue to be strong."

Burlington's capital expenditures in 1969 will total between \$125 and \$150 million against

\$109 million last year, and will be about evenly divided between expansion and modernization for increased efficiency. "Burlington is also pursuing a policy of maximum utilization of existing facilities," he said. "In many instances, we can avoid expenditures for new manufacturing plants by using space previously occupied by less profitable operations for product lines that offer a better return on investment."

"Our emphasis on plant and equipment expansion and improvement over the years has been a major reason for the steady trend of company's growth in Europe is good. "During 1968, we acquired Schappe A. PARENTS OF "BATTERED CHILDREN"

Mexico City (WMNS) — What kind of parent would fracture his child's bones, burn him, cut him?

Dr. Brandt F. Steele, chief of the psychiatric liaison division of the University of Colorado Medical Center, told an International Congress of Pediatricians that parents of "battered children" usually suffer from a "lifelong feeling of emptiness and disappointment and a conviction that the world will never be good to them."

When the world fails to meet their excessive demands for love and attention, these parents turn to the infant for comfort, and lash out at him ferociously for not performing satisfactorily. Frequently, the medical researcher said, these parents were themselves abused as children.

Dr. Steele opposes punishing the offending parents. While it may be necessary to remove the battered child from the home, he said, psychiatric treatment or social work for the adults offer the hope that the child may eventually return home and that other children in the family will escape harm.
