

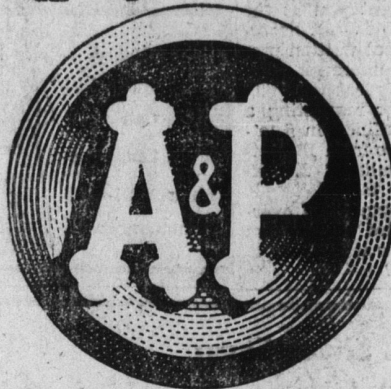

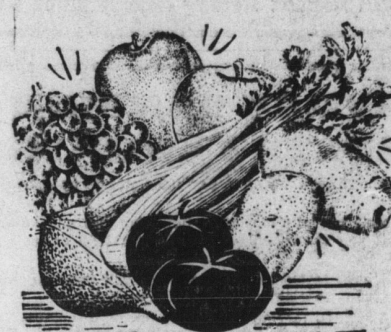

Garden Time

There are many jobs that can be accomplished in November. This month is also a good time to do some thinking and planning to avoid the spring rush.

Muscadine ("Scuppernon") grapes should be pruned this month. Pruning now will prevent bleeding as the wounds will have a chance to heal before growth starts in the spring. Pruning is very important if you expect maximum yields from your vines. It should be done every year and not just occasionally as is so frequently the case, especially on neglected vines trained on an overhead arbor. See your county Extension agent and ask him for our bulletin "Muscadine Grapes," or write me and I will have one sent to you.

bean and other plants in the vegetable garden. This will help control certain insects and diseases which may be carried over to give you trouble in the spring. Plow the garden and leave it rough during the winter. Freezing and thawing will break up the soil particles and make it much easier to prepare a good seed bed in the spring.

Mice Enter Fall Picture

RALEIGH — During cooler fall days, homeowners may find they have new boarders—mice.

"Mice are truly unwanted guests," points out William Gulley, extension pesticide information specialist, North Carolina State University, "for losses due to mice in homes can be considerable."

Before you plow, have your soil tested and add phosphate and lime as needed. Broadcast these materials over the garden area and turn under. This is important because neither of these nutrients moves readily in the soil. By turning under, they are placed in the root zone where they may be readily absorbed by the growing plants in the spring.

Small numbers of mice can usually be removed by using snap traps, the specialist notes. Gulley suggests placing traps along walls between objects or by holes so the trigger is in the route of travel.

Prune those apple and peach trees you have been neglecting and give them a thorough dormant spraying. For this 1 like lime sulphur, 12 gallons to 100 gallons of water. This spray gives a combined insecticide and fungicide and is still one of the best winter clean-up sprays. It is smelly but will do a good job if thoroughly applied. Oil sprays may be used according to the manufacturer's directions. Apply, only, when the temperature is above 50 degrees.

One of the most attractive baits for traps is peanut butter; other baits include bacon rind, meat, cheese or soft candy.

If you have over-seeded your lawn with Italian ryegrass, keep it mowed rather close. Do not prune spring flowering shrubs now but other shrubs may be pruned, if needed. If late shade trees need attention, it is best to employ competent help to do the job for you.

Traps should be checked, emptied and reset once or twice a day, the specialist adds.

Poisonous chemicals are helpful in controlling large numbers of mice in outbuildings or a granary. Warfarin bait is perhaps the least hazardous chemical. Commercially prepared strichnine mouse grain is also effective, but calls for careful disposal of the dead mice since they could be a potential hazard to pets, the specialist warns.

Since food and shelter are musts for mice setting up housekeeping, Gulley suggests you eliminate food supplies and hiding places. "Seal off or screen holes in walls, foundations and floors," he suggests, "and keep food in mouse-proof containers."

Once a general housekeeping, trapping and poisoning program is in progress, control of mice is fairly complete, Gulley observes.
