Total sales at Winn-Dixie food stores were up 13.91 percent dur-ing the 28 weeks ended Jan. 10 compared with the like period last year.

They amounted to \$738,012,849 against \$647,901,432, a gain of \$90,111,417. Earnings after taxes were \$12,714,155 compared with \$12,940,566, representing a percentage to sales of 1.72 percent against 2.00 percent.

Nineteen new stores were open-ed and 12 closed during the 28 weeks. In mid-January, 51 new stores were being developed and 31 of these are scheduled to open by the end of the current fiscal
