NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

The City Board of Commissioners, Kings Mountain, North Carolina, hereby gives notice of a public hearing to be held April 14, 1970 at 8:30 p.m. in the City Hall, Kings Mountain, North Carolina for the purpose of allowing any interested persons to present their views in respect to the proposed redevelopment of the following described area known as the Central Business District Renewal Area, Project No. N. C. R-84, lying and being in the City of Kings Mountain, North Carolina and described as follows:

Beginning at the northeastern corner of the intersection of King Street and Piedmont Avenue and proceeding westerly 820 feet more or less along the northern right-of-way line of King Street to the northwestern corner of the intersection of the rights-of-way of King Street and Railroad Avenue; thence southerly across King Street and along the western right-of-way line of Railroad Avenue 300 feet more or less to the northern property line of a lot fronting on the western right-of-way of Railroad Avenue; thence westerly along said northern property line to its intersection with the eastern right-of-way line of City Street to a point on the western right-of-way line of City Street said distance being 265 feet more or less; thence southerly along the western right-of-way line of City Street 305 feet more or less to the northwestern corner of the intersection of the rights-of-way of City Street and Mountain Street 65 feet more or less to a point said point being a composite side property line of a lot fronting on the south right-of-way line of Mountain Street; thence southerly across Mountain Street and along said aforementioned property line 210 feet more or less to its intersection with a rear property line of a lot fronting on the northern right-of-way line of Gold Street; thence westerly 10 feet more or less along said rear property line to the point of intersection with the westerly side property of the same lot; thence southerly along said westerly property line 240 feet more or less to the northern right-of-way line of Gold Street; thence westerly 10 feet more or less along the northern right-of-way line of Gold Street to a point; thence southerly across Gold Street and along the side property line of a lot fronting on the southern right-of-way line of Gold Street 90 feet more or less to a point; thence southerly in a diagonal 440 feet more or less to a point on the eastern most track of the Southern Railroad; thence southerly from said railroad track 100 feet more or less to a point on the western right-of-way

line of Battleground Road said point being conformal with the southwestern corner of the property located at the southeastern corner of Battleground Road and Gold Street; thence easterly along the rear property lines of lots fronting on the southern right-of-way line of Gold Street 250 feet more or less to the western right-of-way line of Cherokee Street; thence southerly along the western right-of-way line of Cherokee Street 120 feet more or less to a point opposite the northern right-of-way line of Spruce Street; thence easterly across Cherokee Street and along the northern right-of-way line of Spruce Street 460 feet more or less to the northwestern corner of the intersection of the rights-of-way of Spruce Street and Lake Street; thence northerly along the western right-of-way line of Lake Street to the northern right-of-way line of Gold Street 290 feet more or less; thence westerly along the northern right-of-way line of Gold Street 50 feet more or less to the northeast corner of the intersection of the rights-of-way of Gold Street and Piedmont Avenue; thence northerly along the eastern right-of-way line of Piedmont Avenue 1210 feet more or less to the northeastern corner of the intersection of the rights-of-way of King Street and Piedmont Avenue and the point of beginning.

The purpose of this hearing is to consider a proposal for the undertaking of this Urban Renewal Project, under State and Local Law, with Federal financial assistance under Title I of the Housing Act of 1949, as amended; to acquire land in the project area, to demolish or remove buildings and improvements; and to make land available for development or redevelopment by private enterprise or public agencies as authorized by law.

This redevelopment is being undertaken by the Kings Mountain Redevelopment Commission. Proposals with respect both to relocation and to the Urban Renewal Plan will be available for examination at the offices of the Kings Mountain Redevelopment Commission, City Hall, Kings Mountain, North Carolina, during regular office hours, which are from 8:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday prior to and to the hearing and will be open for discussion at the hearing. Any person or organization desiring to be heard will be given an opportunity to be heard at this meeting.

AN ORDINANCE to extend the Corporate Limits of the City of Kings Mountain, N. C.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners has been petitioned under G.S. 160-452, as amended, to annex the area described, herein, and

WHEREAS, the City Clerk has certified the sufficiency of said petition and a public hearing on the question of this annexation was held in council chambers at 6:30 P.M. on the 24th day of March, 1970 and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners does hereby find as a fact that said petition meets the requirements of G.S. 160-452, as amended; Now Therefore

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Kings Mountain, N. C. That it shall be unlawful to trap, hunt, shoot or attempt to shoot or molest in any manner any bird or wild fowl or to rob bird nests or wild fowl nests. Provided, however, if numbers in a particular locality that they constitute a nuisance or a menace to health or property in the opinion of the proper health authorities of the City of Kings Mountain, then in such event said health authorities shall meet with representatives of the Audubon Society, Bird Club, Garden Club, or Humane Society, or as many of said clubs as are found to exist in the City of Kings Mountain, after having given at least three days actual notice of the time and place of said meeting to the representatives of said clubs.

AN ORDINANCE NORTH CAROLINA CLEVELAND COUNTY

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and The Board of Commissioners of the City of Kings Mountain:

That the entire area embraced within the corporate limits of the City of Kings Mountain be, and the same is hereby designated as a BIRD SANCTUARY.

That it shall be unlawful to trap, hunt, shoot or attempt to shoot or molest in any manner any bird or wild fowl or to rob bird nests or wild fowl nests. Provided, however, if numbers in a particular locality that they constitute a nuisance or a menace to health or property in the opinion of the proper health authorities of the City of Kings Mountain, then in such event said health authorities shall meet with representatives of the Audubon Society, Bird Club, Garden Club, or Humane Society, or as many of said clubs as are found to exist in the City of Kings Mountain, after having given at least three days actual notice of the time and place of said meeting to the representatives of said clubs.

Whitener Urges Revised Program For Women

MORGANTON — Former Congressman Basil L. Whitener has urged a revised program of Social Security for the benefit of women. The Gastonian outlined his proposal in a speech to Morganton Business and Professional Women Club in Burke County city on Monday night.

Whitener was the author of legislation to permit women who have worked and paid Social Security taxes to receive fifty percent of the benefits to which they would be entitled based on their earnings upon reaching retirement age in addition to their entitlement under the account of their husband. His proposal would allow working women to elect the basic account and then take one-half of the benefits under the other account so that they would benefit from the money paid by them in Social Security taxes during their working careers.

"As a member of the U. S. House of Representatives I promoted my bill because of a feeling that it is not equitable and fair for a woman to work and pay in Social Security taxes and not be able to get any benefits from her taxes when she reaches retirement age," Whitener stated. "I believe that this fair approach can be written into law if enough of us continue to work for it. Organizations such as the Business and Professional Women Club could very well afford to take the lead in this campaign."

"Recent increases in the amount of Social Security tax paid by every employed person in the United States, coupled with a new policy of the Nixon Administration that persons covered by Medicare must pay the first \$55.00 of hospital costs have the effect of heightening the inequity of the present limitation on the rights of women under Social Security," the veteran legislator asserted. "A better deal for working women under Social Security is absolutely essential."

Whitener recently announced his candidacy for Congress from the 10th Congressional District. He served in the Congress for 12 years prior to 1969.

Be "Good Egg" Don't Crackup In Accidents

Be a good egg this Easter and don't crack up in one of the 1,400 traffic accidents which, the N. C. State Motor Club cautions, could snuff out 24 lives and injure 850 others on North Carolina's streets and highways during the extended weekend.

The state will count its highway toll for the Easter holiday opening the spring travel season from 6 p.m. Friday, March 27, through midnight of Monday, March 30, for a period of 78 hours. Last year during a similar period, 20 persons were killed and 802 injured in 1,364 accidents. In 1968 Easter set an all-time holiday record of 43 killed in the state.
