Job Holding **Survey Set**

Information on the number of persons holding more than one job and the total of hours worked at each job will be collected during a survey to be conducted in this area during the week of May 17, according to Joseph R. Norwood, Director of the regional office of the Bureau of the Census in Charlotte.

Local interviews will be part of a nationwide effort to measure dual job holding in the U. S. They will be conducted in conjunction with the Bureau's monthly survey of employment and unemployment. Employment statistics are gathered monthly by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation. Households to be interview ed here are part of a scientifically designed sample of the U.S. population.
