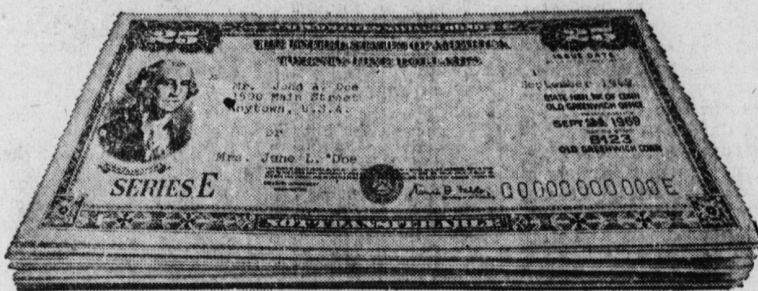
The shepherds were portrayed by John L. McGill, Don Crawford, and Carl Fulton.

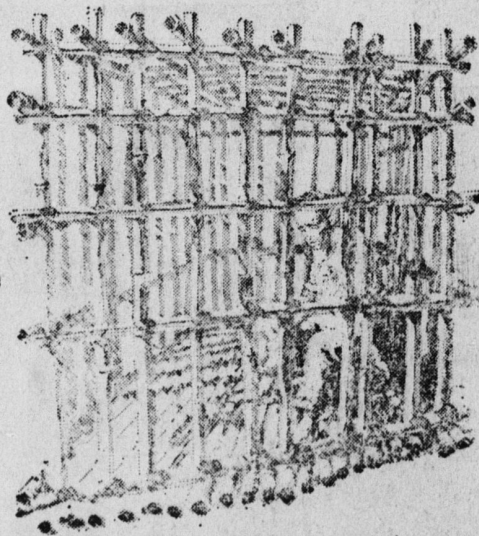
