

GROVER NEWS

An analysis of the characteristics of enrollees in the Job Opportunities in the Business Sector (JOBS) program shows that nearly 90 percent of the hires are members of minority groups; 50 percent are under 22 years of age; and 15 percent formerly received public assistance. In addition, the average hire has been unemployed for more than 21 weeks during the previous year and his average family income was \$2,438, far below the poverty level.
