

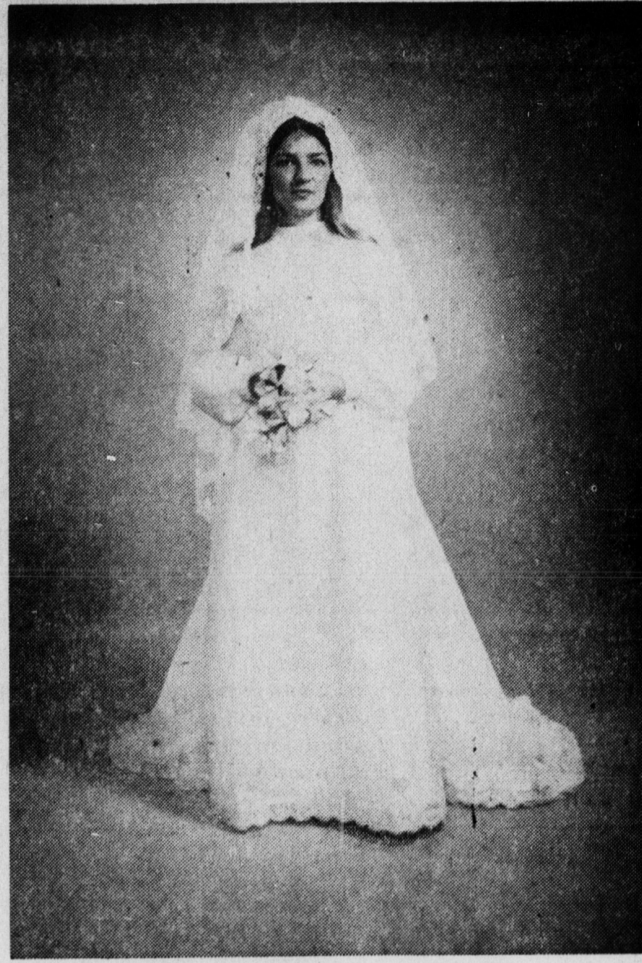

Reuben Sandwich Is Popular Item For Budget-Minded Shopper; A Recipe

If you are a budget minded shopper you probably join "Mrs. Wiggs in the cabbage patch" figuratively if not literally. Sauerkraut is a piquant dish made from cabbage fermented with salt. Its history dates back some 2,600 years to a Chinese Emperor, but we frequently associate kraut with hearty German cookery. Kraut kept well and was a good source of vitamin C to prevent scurvy; hence, it was one of the earliest world travelers in foods.

Though kraut may still be made at home, processors take care of this work and we find canned kraut in our grocery stores. There is one large kraut plant in northwest North Carolina in the cabbage producing area. Not only is kraut made but also a "cocktail" combining tomato and kraut juice. It is a tangy juice that re-

sembles V-8 and is found on many grocery shelves now.

Kraut is inexpensive, easy to use, has only approximately 35 calories per cup and is a good staple to keep on hand in summer and winter. It is an excellent accompaniment to sausage, frankfurters, ham, and pork but is more versatile and adaptable than generally expected. The following recipes are surprising but worth a try.

REUBEN SANDWICH

The Reuben has taken the country by storm. Now you can serve this succulent grilled combo of corned beef, Swiss cheese and kraut on rye at home.

- 2 cups drained sauerkraut
- 1/2 teaspoon caraway or dill seed
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- 16 slices rye bread
- 1/2 cup Russian dressing
- 1 pound thinly sliced corned beef
- 1 pound sliced Swiss cheese

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
