Otis D. Green Post 155 Auxiliary of Kings Mountain and Warren F. Hoyle Post 82 of Shelby are sponsoring the luncheon.

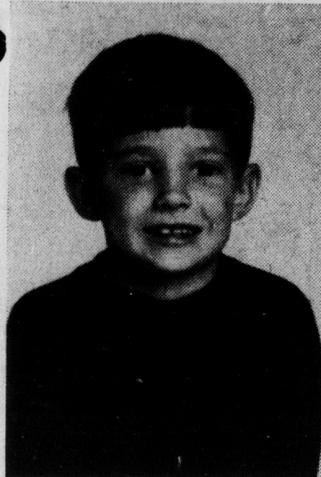

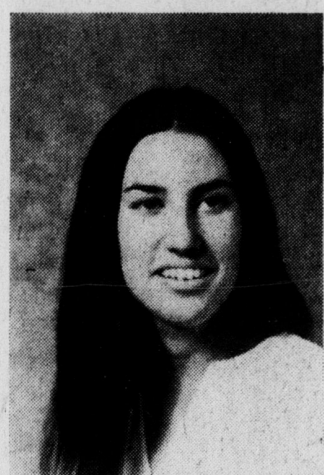
The students are involved in eight weeks of intensive training in the classroom setting.

During this period they will observe the regular teacher and later will take over the classroom duties under the supervision of the supervising teacher.

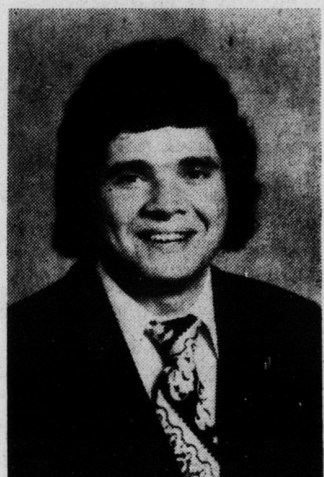

### Mrs. McDowell Is Tapped For Church Board

COLUMBUS, Ohio.—Mrs. Ruth McDowell, Kings Mountain, N. C., has been elected to the board of directors of the United Church Board for World Ministries, overseas missionary arm of the two-million-member United Church of Christ.

Mrs. McDowell's election was announced at the 163rd annual meeting of the United Church board, held Oct. 22-25 in Columbus, Ohio. The 225-member board includes clergy and lay men and women from all over the country and abroad. It is responsible for the work of 300 missionaries in 20 countries. Through such organizations as the World Council of Churches, All-Africa Conference of Churches and the World Association for Christian Communication, it carries on work in another 30 countries. Founded in 1810, the board was the first

agency to send missionaries abroad from the United States.

Mrs. McDowell has been a member of the United Church Board for World Ministries since 1969. From 1947 until 1959 she served with her husband, Rev. Dr. Henry C. McDowell, as an educational missionary in Angola. The McDowells have recently returned to North Carolina, their home state, from Miami, Fla., where Dr. McDowell was minister of the Open Door church.

The McDowells are members of the First Congregational church, Greensboro. Mrs. McDowell also participates in the National Association of College Women, the Young Women's Christian Association and Delta Sigma Theta sorority. She was educated at Bennett college, Greensboro, and Teachers college, Winston-Salem, N. C.

Miss Trott and Jerry Blanton will be married Saturday. Miss Hauser and Stanley Brown will be married Dec. 2.

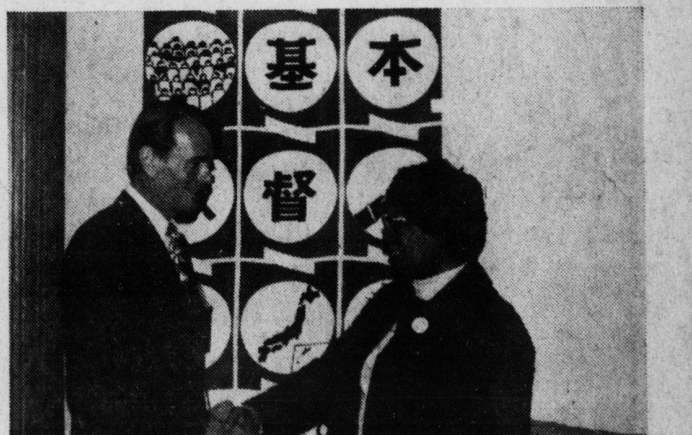
Punch was served in the family room.
