## Future Farmers Are Celebrating FFA Week Here

More than 22,000 members of the North Carolina Association of Future Farmers of America will observe National FFA Week, February 17-24. "FFA Unites Youth With Opportunities" is the theme of this year's observance, according to Charles Keels, State FFA Advisor for the State Education Agency.

Officers of the State FFA Association will take part in various activities on the State level. They are: R. W. Underwood, Atrypville, President and Vice Presidents, Randall Lanier, Winston-Salem; James Raynor, Mt. Olive, Steve Davis, Leasburg; John Fedoranko, Burgaw; and Alan McKinney, China Grove.

Governor Holshouser, officially proclaiming the North Carolina observance said, "the FFA has performed the valuable service of developing leadership, promoting cooperation, promoting good citizenship, teaching modern agricultural information, and inspiring patriotism among its members; and the FFA motto 'Learning to live, living to serve' establishes a direction of purpose for the future leaders of our production agriculture and agribusiness".

The principle activity planned by the State FFA officers is a Goodwill Luncheon on February 19 in Raleigh. It is designed to recognize those who are contributing to FFA work, both in North Carolina and in the National organization, and to acquaint them with current and projected FFA activities.

There are 330 local FFA chapters in the State's public school system. The FFA is composed of students of vocational agriculture who are preparing for careers in farming and other aspects of the agricultural industry.

The FFA is an integral part of vocational agriculture. It serves to motivate students in their work and to extend a supplement to their learning experiences in vocational agriculture. Development of leadership skills, participation in cooperative efforts and the building of character and citizenship are the cornerstones of FFA.

Numerous awards are available to FFA members to motivate and recognize them for outstanding achievement in a variety of agricultural pursuits. North Carolina FFA members receive approximately \$20,000 annually through this incentive awards program. Most of these awards are provided by agricultural business and organizations in the State.

## Snow Results: Three Wrecks

Saturday's snow apparently was the cause of three traffic accidents in Kings Mountain but none resulted in personal injury.

Lt. Bob Hayes was the investigating officer in each case concerning the snow and Hayes filed charges against two drivers.

He charged David Head of 198 Morris Street with driving too fast for conditions after Head's car hit an icy spot and hit a parked car owned by Horace Willard Brown of 603 Groves Avenue. The accident occurred on South Piedmont Avenue.

Damage to Head's car was listed at \$300 and damage to Brown's vehicle was estimated at \$150.

Hayes charged Charlie Webster Barnes of 100 McGill Road with following too close after his car hit an icy spot and struck a car driven by James Junior Harrelson of 600 Clay Street. Hayes estimated damage to Harrelson's car at \$200 and damage to Barnes' car at \$150.

In another accident blamed on the snow, Hayes reported that a car driven by Hazel Childers Hipp of 623 East Gold Street hit an icy spot and slid into a mail box owned by the U. S. Post Office. Hayes estimated damage to Mrs. Hipp's car at \$25 and damage to the mail box at \$50. No charges were filed.

Another Saturday wreck investigated by Ptl. M. S. Criswell, resulted in \$2,400 in damages. Criswell charged William Pearson of 207 Fairview Street

with a stop light violation after her car reportedly ran the stop light at the intersection of Piedmont and Ridge street and struck a car driven by Pamela Jane Arrwood of Route 2. Damage to the Pearson car was listed at \$1,900 and damage to the Arrwood car was listed at \$300.

A three-car wreck Friday resulted in \$1,500 damage, according to Ptl. Criswell's report.

His report indicated that cars driven by Bruce Eugene Putnam of Ellenboro and Robert Lee Shires of Ellenboro were stopped in a traffic lane when a car driven by James Ronald Thomas of Mars Hill struck the Shires car in the rear, causing it to hit the Putnam car in the rear.

Both of the cars carrying the Ellenboro men were owned by Lee Motor Co. of Rutherfordton. Damage to the two Lee Motor Co. cars was listed at \$1,000 and damage to the Thomas car was listed at \$500.
