## TAR HEEL FOOTNOTES

News of art, history and other related endeavors via radio is one of many ways in which the Department of Art, Culture and History attempts to broaden the base of those knowing about, enjoying and supporting cultural activities in North Carolina.

Two years ago this month, the first broadcast of "Tar Heel Footnotes," a weekly five-minute feature, was heard on about 35 stations across the state.

For its first several months, the program dealt exclusively with subjects of historical interest, but other related topics are not included. The broadening of subjects was brought on by the reorganization of state government which combined under one department the state-owned historical sites, history museum, archives, art museum, library, arts council and other agencies.

Even though several radio sta-

tion in addition to those on the original list actually requested that they receive taped copies of the program to air on a regular public service basis, expansion was impossible for the first few months due to a lack of state funds to cover the costs of production and mailing. Public spirited broadcasters were willing to provide the air time free of charge.

New, two years later, the program is heard weekly on almost one hundred stations—and at practically no cost to the state. Rapid expansion was made possible by a continuing financial grant from Martin Marietta Aggregates, a North Carolina-based division of the national company. Wayne Pennington, the company's vice president for public relations, first became aware of the program and promoted its support among other officials including Godfrey Cheshire, vice president and treasurer.

The Martin Marietta grant which covers all costs of production and distribution, along with the combined value of air time

provided by participating radio station, adds up to a sizeable sum which the state could not consider paying with public funds.

"Tar Heel Footnotes" programs often feature sketches of historic sites, reports on new publications, special exhibitions at the state museums of art and history, local projects of historical and cultural groups across the state and a large variety of other related topics.

Among broadcasts scheduled for April are an interview with the chairman of the Historic Eden Commission about the biennial tour of homes and public buildings known as the "Eden Pilgrimage"; a report on the Ft. Fisher Preservation Laboratory which provides special treatment for artifacts recovered from sunken ships; and an often-requested repeat of two programs featuring excerpts from actual news broadcasts made when the Roosevelt funeral train stopped at Salisbury, North Carolina, in April of 1945.

Each participating station airs "Tar Heel Footnotes" at a time of its own choosing, though usually at the same time each week.

## TAXPAYERS ASK IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q.—Because my husband and I both work, we have a maid come in to clean up and to be there when our child comes home from school. Can we deduct the maid's salary as a child care expense?

A.—You can deduct expenses for ordinary and usual household services if they are employment related and if you meet the other requirements for this deduction. For more information on these requirements, see IRS Publication 503, "Child Care and Dependent Care." It's available free by writing your Internal Revenue District office.

Q.—I pay my sister \$10 a week to take care of my child while I go out to work. Are these payments deductible as child care expenses?

A.—No. Payments made to relatives or dependent household members may not be included in computing the child care deduction. Such persons include: Chil-

dren, stepchildren, brothers or sisters, stepbrothers or stepsisters, parents, stepparents, nephews or nieces, aunts or uncles in a din-law.

Q.—What kinds of medical expenses are deaf persons likely to deduct?

A.—Some medical expenses deaf persons are likely to deduct include: payments for hearings and component parts guide log expenses; the cost of sending a deaf person to school to learn to lip-read (including meals and lodging); and the cost of special telephone equipment which enables a deaf person to communicate effectively over a regular telephone via converted telephone signals.

Among the other items that may be deducted as medical expenses are unreimbursed medical insurance premiums (one-half, up to \$150, directly, the balance subject to the general limitations on medical expenses) and bus and tax fares or the cost of driving to and from the doctor.

Remember, medical expenses are deductible only if you itemize and except for the special rule for medical insurance premiums, may be deducted only to the extent they exceed three percent of your income. For more

information, see IRS Publication 502, "Deduction for Medical and Dental Expenses." Just use the order blank on the back of your tax forms package to obtain a free copy.

Q.—I took a new job out of state and had to move. What moving expenses can I deduct?

A.—If you qualify, you can deduct as moving expenses: 1) travel expenses (including meals and lodging) from your old residence to your new one; 2) the cost of moving household goods; 3) the cost of premove house hunting trips; 4) the cost of temporary quarters at the new location during any period of 30 consecutive days after obtaining work; and 5) the cost of selling your residence.

For details on the limitations and requirements for the moving expense deductions, see IRS Publication 521, "Tax Information on Moving Expenses." For a free, copy fill out and mail the order blank on the back of your tax forms package.

Q.—Where can I get a copy of your officials income tax guide?

A.—IRS Publication 17, "Your Federal Income Tax," is available for 75 cents at Internal Revenue Office bookstores and many post offices. For business taxpayers, IRS Publication 334, "Tax Guide for Small Business," may also be helpful. It may also

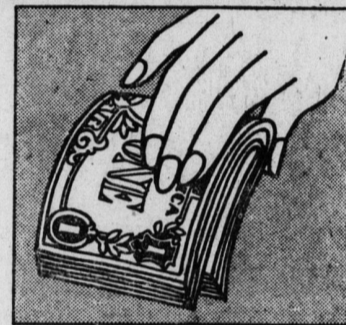
