The Yo-Yo Quilt, popular in the Roaring Twenties, has been revived by quiltmakers in 1976 and a Kings Mountain housewife (Mrs. Myrtle Carl) Goforth Monday handstitched her 988th piece of six inch yo-yo, roundshaped material, to fashion an elegant Christmas present for her husband's boss from New

her beautiful quilt in April. It's actually her third Yo-Yo coverlet which she calls a "mixture of all kinds and colors of scrap materials." She figures the quilt cost her about \$15 worth of materials which she bought downtown and 1,000 yards of thread, two spools of 500 yards each.

Mrs. Goforth's handwork is expertly and meticiously done and she's used her sewing as good therapy for arthritis in her fingers and hands the past

When she isn't quilting or crocheting beautiful afghans or making decorative pillows and other pretty odds and ends for her comfortable home, the epitome of good taste, Myrtle Goforth is writing poetry.

She's author of more than 100 poems and mailed five recently to publishing houses in Nashville, Tenn. Her favorite is "Nature," which she wrote in 1928. Subjects for her poems come from acquaintances and church sermons.

Mrs. Goforth, the former Myrtle Misenheimer of Concord and Blacksburg, S. C., developed her writing skill at Blacksburg, S. C. High School and was a "school stringer" for the Spartanburg, S. C. Herald. Some of her poetry has been published in area newspapers, including The Charlotte Observer.

Mrs. Goforth met her husband when both were students at Blacksburg High. The Misenheimer family had moved from Concord to Blacksburg where Mr. Misenheimer wned and operated a shoe

Although Mr. Goforth doesn't share his wife's talents in the sewing room, he still likes to putter in the kitchen, even after 25 years as a chef in Hendersonville, Gaffney, Spartanburg and Greensboro during the early years of their marriage. The Go-forths moved to Kings Mountain about 18 years ago from Greensboro, there Carl was in the food business. Mr. Goforth joined Neisco Mills here where he is controller and

ecretary-treasurer. Mrs. Goforth, quite adept as a saleswoman, recalled that during the war years she ran the family hardware store in Hendersonville while her husband was in the foods business. She smiled when she recalled that male customers for wiring, plugs and switches 'amazed" that the lady could show and sell them the particular product they needed for their home.

Declaring that "you have to be in the mood to sew well and write poetry," Myrtle Goforth said she started sewing for her two brothers and sister at age 13 and "kept it up." She continues to sew for her children and grand-

C. and Ginger (Mrs. Robert) Whisnant, Jr. of Albuquerque, New Mexico. The Greenville Goforths, including the four children, Diane, a nurse, Rebecca, a college student in Clinton, S. C., Leanne, a 10th grader, and Billy, an eighth grader, will all come to Kings Mountain for Thanksgiving dinner with their grandparents on Crescent Hill Dr. The Whisnants, both of whom teach in New Mexico, will drive to Kings Mountain for the Christmas holidays.

Carl and Myrtle Goforth bought their new home a little over a year ago and have enjoyed decorating and furnishing the fourbedroom residence. Carl converted one of the bedrooms to an office and has also added black wroughtiron railing to enhance the patio where Myrtle's plants are in profusion in springtime and summer.

Mrs. Goforth likes to sew in front of an open fire and TV in the den where she has completed a Granny afghan for a King-size bed in rose, red, and green, a two-yard wide afghan in green, brown and navy for another Christmas present, and has more projects after the holidays.


