## KMHS Junior Varsity Girls Cagers SWC Co-Champions With 10-2 Record

jayvee girls basketballers defeated East Rutherford 38-17 Thursday to clinch a share of the Southwestern Conference championship.

The victory ended the Little Mountainettes' season. Coach Joe Rountree's ladies finished with a 10-2 record, same as R-S Central.

It was no contest Thursday at East as the KM ladies ran to a 15-1 first quarter lead, and toyed with the Lady Cavaliers after that. Coach Rountree began clearing his bench early in the second period.

"I was real nervous about this game," noted Rountree, 'because East Rutherford almost beat R-S Central last week. But our girls just went out

Elizabeth McGill led the KM scoring 10 points and Robin McSwain and Sabra Bristol added eight each.

"I'm not trying to run down East," said Roun-tree, "but that was a boring game to watch. Our girls could have gone up there without a coach and beat them. We even put people in different positions to make it interesting."

The Mountainettes led by 25-5 at halftime and 32-9 after three quarters.

The Little Mountainettes became the first KMHS basketball team to win a conference championship since 1969-70 when the varsity boys team won the SWC title with an unbeaten

"Our success this year was due to the fact that we played excellent defense and played well together as a team," noted Roun-tree. "Needless to say, I enjoyed my first year of

The lone defeats for the KM ladies came in first round play, when they dropped road games to Shelby and Burns. They avenged both of those losses recently in the KMHS gym, beating both county rivals without the help of one of their top scorers and rebounders, Barbara McClain, who sat out the second half with an injury.

Probably KM's most satisfying win came Wednesday at home when the Mountainettes hombed

Shelby 57-26 in a game that wasn't as close as the final score indicated. Coach Rountree, a Shelby graduate, began clearing his bench early in the second period after running up a 14-4 first quarter

The Mountainettes were out front 80-12 at intermission and 46-18 after three periods.

Elizabeth McGill almost single-handedly scored as many points as the entire Shelby club. She ripped the nets for a 28 points, most of any KMHS player this

Cheryl Leach and Sabra Bristol added nine points apiece and Annette Littlejohn scored eight.

Shelby Coach Caroline Dedmon was ejected from the game in the second half

after drawing three straight technical fouls. McGill shot six technical free throws, hitting four.

Kings Mountain's boys, who led the SWC much of the season, dropped their final two games to end their season with a 9-5 record.

Kings Mountain High's heavyweight, David Gordon, came in second place in the Western N. C. High Schools Activities Association tournament last week in Salisbury, but can take some pride in the fact that he won the association championship for Concord High School.

Gordon, KM's 5-11, 240pounder, was matched in the heavyweight finals against 6-5, 300-pound Bill Cooper of Watauga.

Gordon suffered a groin injury with 22 seconds left in the match and it was thought Cooper might be awarded the victory on a default, which would have given him 16 team points.

But Gordon came up off the mat to finish the match and lost by a 10-5 decision. The decision Watauga only 14 team points and they finished one-point shy of Concord in the team standings.

"Gordon was badly disappointed," noted KMHS Coach Bo Goforth. because he felt like he could have beaten Cooper. The only big difference in the two was Cooper's size. "But David has nothing

to be ashamed of," he went on. "He gave a good showing and he's only the second wrestler ever from Kings Mountain to reach the association finals.' KMHS The other wrestler to make the finals

was Alfred Ash, who won the title four years ago. Ash is now a member of the Appalachian wrestling Gordon won four mat-

ches, two by pins, before reaching the finals against Cooper. The loss to Cooper was the only one suffered by Gordon this season.

Gordon opened the a pin over Bill Ellis of West Iredell and he came back in the second round with a pin or Paul Pierce of South over Iredell.

He won a 18-7 decision over seventh seeded Logan Fufe of Trinity in the third round and took a 10-7 decision over sixth seeded Leon Gaither in the semi-finals.

Sammy Bell, 105, lost to Poore of West Rowan; Tim Mitchem, 112, lost to Fesperman of Trinity; Lawyer Lewis, 126, was pinned by eighth-seeded Lefevers of Hudson; Ponder Sherrill, 182, lost by default to Foust of South Point when he re-injured his back: Robert Ingram. 188, lost to third seeded Richie of Concord, who went on to finish second; Tim Spicer, 185, lost a narrow 14-18 decision to VanAuken of Mooresville; and Bruce Valentine, 195, dropped a narrow decision to Roger Deals of North

Tim Speight, a 155pounder from Albemarle and the brother of Kings Mountain Junior High coach Joe Speight, won the title in his weight division.
