

Thornburgs In Bahamas For Wedding Trip

Harry Matthews, Dean of Instruction at Cleveland Tech, has announced the resumption of Friday classes to begin Fri., Mar. 4.

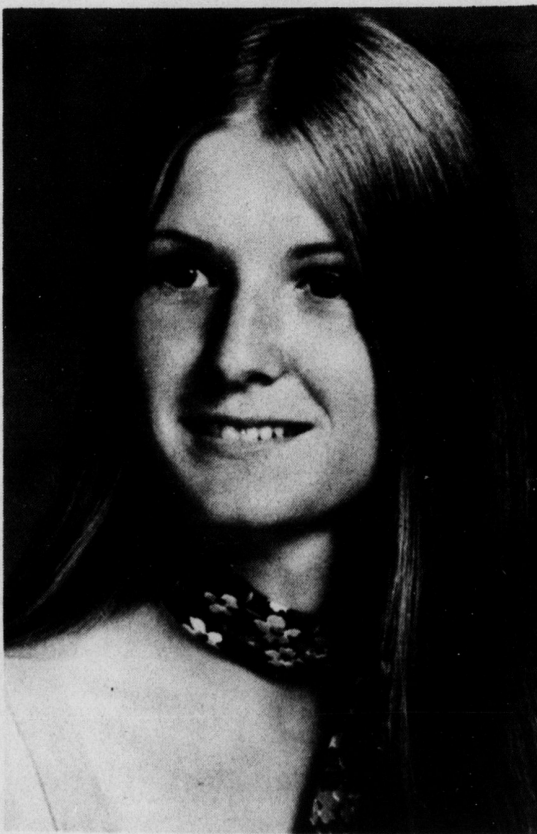
In compliance with Gov. Jim Hunt's request to conserve energy, Cleveland Tech reduced its five-day operation to four days during the month of February.
