Pouchak Gets 12 Months

Paul Pouchak, 23, of 105 S. Goforth St., was arrested Monday afternoon by local and Gaston county officers after a high speed chase

and charged with resisting arrest, reckless driving, assault with deadly weapon, a car, failure to stop for blue light and siren, and assaulting an

officer. Pouchak received a 12-month active sentence on the Gaston County charges Monday, the judge stipulating that the defendant undergo doctor's examination and receive treatment, if necessary. The Cleveland County charges are slated for hearing in Cleveland District Court March 30.

Ivey said he gave pursuit East on King St., with assistance from Ptl. Ralph Grindstaff for about 10 miles at speeds ranging from 50 to 75 miles per hour, the Pouchak car blowing a tire after narrowly missing two cars and hitting a bridge on I-85 and 274 in Gaston County, according to Ptl. Ivey, ramming a patrol car at a rockblock at I-85 and 274 operated by Gaston Ptl. A. W. Lancaster who reportedly removed the driver forcibly from his car when Pouchak refused to get out of the vehicle, according to reports of officers.

Both the police car operated by Ptl. Grindstaff and Pouchak's car were heavily damaged, according to Ptl. Ivey. There were no damages to the Gaston County patrol car, according to KMPD.

Stretch Is Man On Go

City dog warden Stretch Bollinger traveled 6,692 miles on-the-job during the past six months, according to reports filed in the Kings Mountain Police Department.

The report summarizing his activities revealed that the dog warden transported 298 dogs and cats to the county animal shelter during this period, returned 35 pets to their owners, assisted in 20 animal "adoptions," took 199 radio calls through the dispatch office concerning animals, contacting 493 persons regarding their dogs, issued 41 warnings to dog owners, and six warrants during this period.

Maner Home Burglarized Of Furnishings Worth \$600

More than \$600 worth of furnishings were reported stolen from the residence of B. F. Maner, Kings Mountain Insuranceman, during the weekend, according to reports of the Cleveland County Sheriff's Department.

Reportedly stolen between Saturday and Monday were four table lamps, one electric fan, one antique brass candlestick, one trash can and one flashlight.

Damage to a door through which entrance was gained was estimated at \$25, according to the sheriff's report.

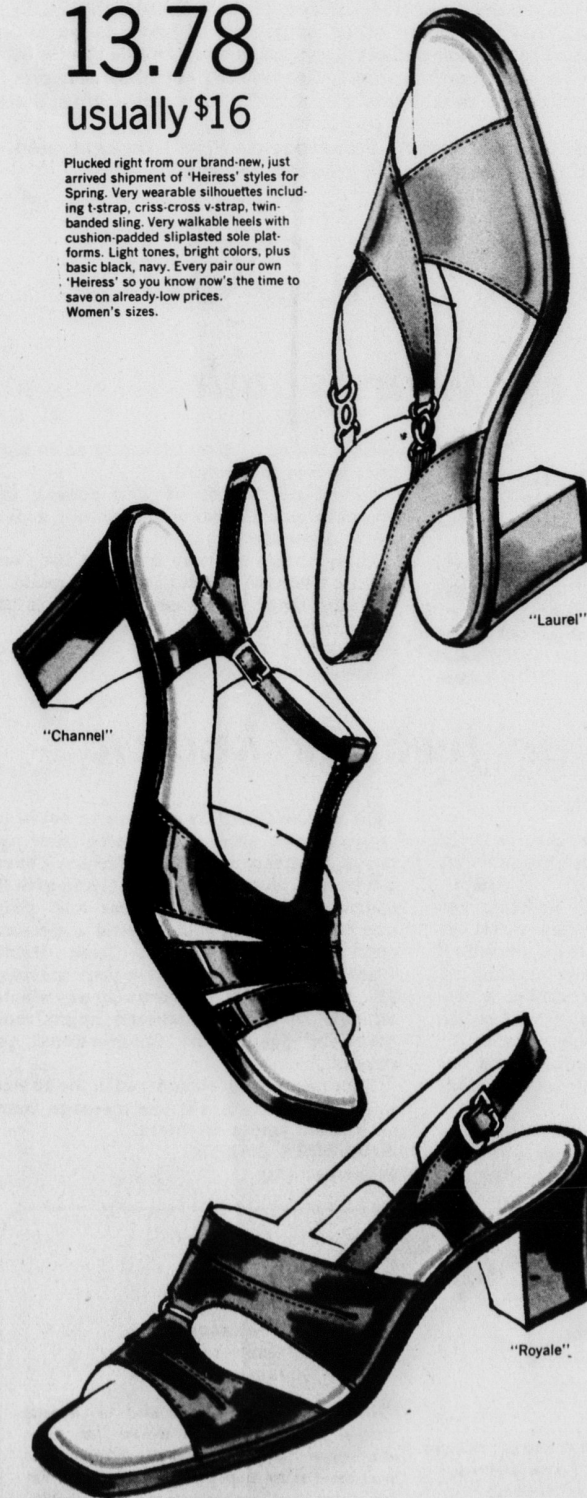
