Hearing Program Planned

BOILING SPRINGS -Gardner-Webb College, in conjunction with the Department of Deaf Ministries of the North Carolina Baptist Convention, has announced the establishment of a cooperative program which will enable hearingimpaired students to enroll at the 1,400-student liberal arts college.

The announcement was made at the college's 70th commencement exercises Sunday afternoon.

In making the announcement, Dr. Craven E. Williams, president of the college, stated, "The higher educational opportunities for the deaf are far too limited. There are quite a few students at Gardner-Webb who already have the necessary skills to serve as classroom interpreters, and we know of many others eager to learn how to communicaate with the deaf.

"We fully expect many



to learn sign language so our deaf students will feel right at home on the Gardner-Webb campus."

The Rev. Jerry Potter, North Carolina's Minister to the Deaf, described the new program as "truly an answer to prayer."

"My work with the deaf has convinced me of the magnificent contributions the deaf can and do make to our society," he noted. "I have dreamed for several years of an opportunity to expand our services to the college level. Now we have that opportunity at Gardner-Webb, and I am looking forward to beginning a new dimension of my work with the deaf at the college." It is estimated that there are more than 12,000 people in North and South Carolina with hearing impairments. According to Dr. Williams, many of these are fully capable of college-level work.

"There will be no special courses or programs specifically for the deaf or from which the deaf will be excluded," he pointed out. "We are not adding something to our program or our curriculum. We are only adding another medium of communication which will enable us to serve the needs of another group of students who have been overlooked far too long."

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
