

## Survey To Be Made

# Moss Beach Closed

The Kings Mountain Lake Authority Friday morning at 8 a. m. suspended for the rest of the summer all swimming and beach activity at John Henry Moss Lake.

Lake Authority Secretary Glee E. Bridges said the action was taken because of complaints and criticism about the safety of the area and that the lake would not reopen to the public until safety surveys and improvements are made.

The suspension, said Bridges, does not affect boating, skiing and fishing at the lake. Gardner Gidley and Associates of Winston Salem will conduct the survey.

Mr. Bridges said that a maximum of 200 people are on the beach and in the water on weekends and that with this

group of people more lifeguards are needed. Presently only three lifeguards are employed and each of them, Becky Thompson, David Cadenhead and Tony Sabetti, say more are needed and more adequate safety precautions are needed.

Although there have been no drownings in the swim area of the lake, there have been incidents where swimmers got into trouble and had to be rescued. In another incident, a swimmer suffered a broken neck after diving into the shallows. One lifeguard said the swimmer twisted himself off balance to avoid hitting another swimmer and landed on his head breaking his neck.

With doubling of activities at the lake, Mr. Bridges said members felt an improved

system in monitoring lake safety is needed.

Mayor John Moss presided at the meeting also attended by M. C. Pruette, Henry P. Neisler, Ray Cline, all authority members, and Ptl. Gene McSwain, Captain Jackie Barrett, and Codes Director Al Moretz.

In other actions, the Authority formally filed for a second application for state and federal funds through the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation for continuing program development of the lake recreation area. The funds would be used to develop such areas as the beach front, the fishing pier, the camping area, the picnic shelter and a new boat launch.

### CITY OF KINGS MOUNTAIN PUBLIC NOTICE TO ALL INTERESTED AGENCIES, GROUPS AND PERSONS

Notice is hereby given that on August 9, 1977, the City of Kings Mountain will submit to the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development a request and certification for the release of Community Development Block Grant Funds. The request and certification relate to the application of the City of Kings Mountain for a grant of funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 for the purpose of undertaking the projects hereinafter described:

#### 1. WATER IMPROVEMENTS

A. To complete - Double treatment capacity at Ellison Plant. Estimated total project cost - \$380,000  
B. To complete - 2 M. G. storage reservoir, pump station and water main, Cleveland Avenue. Estimated total project cost - \$38,000.

#### 2. SEWERAGE IMPROVEMENTS

A. Upgrade wastewater transportation system to increase employment opportunities for low and moderate income families. Estimated total project cost - \$320,000.

#### 3. IMPROVEMENTS TO NEIGHBORHOOD FACILITY

Construction of an addition including offices and operating facilities for Community Development programs (Home-based Child Care, Aging, etc.), entrance and restrooms; expand upstairs poeition into Community Recreation area for low and moderate income persons. Estimated total project cost - \$280,000.

#### 4. KINGS MOUNTAIN PROGRAM FOR THE AGING

Estimated total project cost - \$35,000.

#### 5. HOME-BASED CHILD CARE PROGRAM FOR LOW INCOME CHILDREN

Estimated total project cost - \$21,500.

#### 6. KINGS MOUNTAIN DEVELOPMENT OFFICE

Estimated total project cost - \$10,000.

#### 7. URBAN BEAUTIFICATION PROGRAM. SITE IMPROVEMENTS.

A. Deal Street Recreation Park  
B. Davidson Street Recreation Park  
C. Urban Renewal Project R-84

Estimated total project cost - \$12,500.

#### 8. REPAIR AND CONSTRUCTION OF SIDEWALKS IN LOW AND MODERATE INCOME AREAS.

Estimated total project cost - \$15,000.

#### 9. HOUSING REHABILITATION IN LOW AND MODERATE INCOME AREAS.

(Neighborhoods 5, 6 and 7) Estimated total project cost - \$50,000.

#### 10. PURCHASE OF PROPERTY FOR SECTION 8 HOUSING.

Estimated total project cost - \$86,000.

The City of Kings Mountain has prepared an environmental review record respecting the above-described projects (other than those listed as being exempt) for which the release of funds is being sought. The environmental review record is available at the Mayor's Office, Kings Mountain City Hall, between the hours of 8:30 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. Monday through Friday for public inspection where the same may be examined by the public and copies thereof obtained.

The applicant requesting release of funds for the above-described projects is the City of Kings Mountain, P. O. Box 429, Kings Mountain, North Carolina, 28086. The applicant's chief executive officer is John Henry Moss, Mayor.

The City of Kings

Mountain will undertake the projects described above with Block Grant funds from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Kings Mountain is certifying to HUD that the City of Kings Mountain and John Henry Moss, in his official capacity as Mayor, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the City of Kings Mountain may use the Block Grant funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases:

(A) That the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer of the applicant; or

(B) That applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process.

Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58), and may be addressed to HUD Area Office at 415 North Edgeworth Street, Greensboro, North Carolina, 27401. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after August 9, 1977, will be considered by HUD.

## More Meetings Planned


In neighboring Bessemer City, Jenny Lee was winner of the first bike and her older sister claimed the second bike on Friday.
