Blanton Is Re-elected

Charles D. Blanton was re-elected President of the North Carolina Pharmaceutical Research Foundation at the annual meeting in Chapel Hill Sept. 27th. The NCPRF was founded 31 years ago as a vehicle by which pharmacists in North Carolina might support pharmacy education

and research at the school of Pharmacy in Chapel Hill. Combined assets of the foundation exceed \$500,000 and an average of over \$40,000 yearly has been provided in support of the school.

Mr. Blanton, is a former partner in Kings Mountain Drug Co. A

pharmacist for 24 years, he is a past president of the N. C. Pharmaceutical Association, recipient of several pharmacy awards, and a past president of the Kings Mountain Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Blanton is currently employed as a pharmacist by the Jack Eckerd Corporation.

Head Start Meet Held

A three-day session "to increase the effectiveness of services to children in Head Start" was held at Lake Junaluska last week.

Anganette Homesly, of Kings Mountain, director of Cleveland County Head Start attended the session along with directors from five other programs.

The first day of the session was devoted to orientation. Tuesday, mini-workshops were conducted in administration, parent involvement, nutrition and education. The final day was devoted to writing individualized education plans for children in Head Start based on the Education for All Handicapped Act.

Art Classes

Set In KM

The Continuing Education Department of Cleveland Tech will sponsor two art classes to be held at the Kings Mountain Community Center.

Steve Greenway is instructor for the classes.

Basic drawing begins Tues., Oct. 11, from 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

This course has been designed to familiarize the beginning artist with the fundamental elements of drawing. Included in this course will be studies in line, modeling, and composition. There will be an emphasis on the problems represented by volume, perspective, and proportion. In an attempt to better understand the elements of drawing, the still-life, figure, and landscape will be utilized. Media for the course will be determined by individual preference.

Water color paintings begins Tues., Oct. 11 from 8:30 to 9:30 p. m.

This course examines the liquidous media of water color. There will be an emphasis on the still-life and landscape, along with discussions on proper brush selections and papers. The course will enable the beginner to understand the difference between opaque and transparent, and also instruct the correct methods of palette and paper preparation.
