Car Struck In Rear

Two automobile accidents occurred in the city during the weekend. A "Rear end" collision occurred Saturday at 8:45 p. m. on Fulton St. when a 1971 Ford operated by Mary E. Lisk, 311 Somerset Dr., slowing to make a right turn into a driveway, was struck by a

\$200. Damages to the front end of the 1970 Ford were estimated at \$300. No injuries were reported and drivers were not charged.

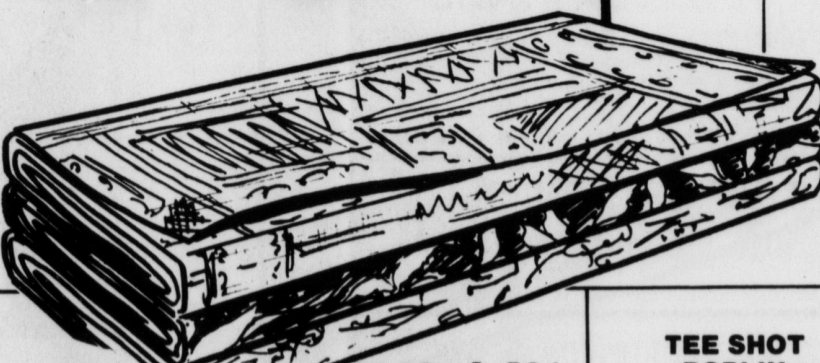
