

The board took similar action on purchase of materials for storm drainage pipe on Ark Street and adjacent areas, with the city providing pipe and engineering and the state doing installation work. This project calls for 150 feet of 30 inch pipe and 300 feet of 36 inch pipe for a total cost of materials the state will provide at \$11,120 with the city paying \$4500 to take care of drainage area off the right-of-way from N. C. 216 and the low-lying areas, Engineer Moretz explained. "Drainage is a real problem in

these areas that we need to correct," said Moretz. The board took the recommenda-

tion of the city planning and zoning - and Betty Campbell to rezone from board and rezoned from N-B to R-8 property of W. James Carpenter at 102 N. Dilling St. The matter had been tabled from a previous meeting.






