Decrease In Food Stamp Fee

The Cleveland County Department of Social Services wants food stamp households in the area to know that if their heating or utility bills go up substantially this winter, the amount they pay for their food stamps may go down. Under new food stamp rules effective Jan. 1, 1978, households may be able to get adjustments in their food stamp purchase price if heating and/or utility bills increase by more than \$25 over the previous month. Food stamp purchase prices are based on income, after allowable deductions. When deductions for heating and utility costs increase, purchase prices may go down because there is less income available to the household. The Social Services staff says food stamp households will now be able to use their most recent utility bills to claim a larger deduction, even if they have not paid their bills yet. Households for which standard tables were used to compute the deduction for utility costs will be able to switch from the standard allowance to actual bills only once during the certification period. Other households may switch to the standard once during their certification period, or to the standard when it's updated. Allowable heating and utility bills include heating and cooking fuel, electricity, water and sewage, garbage and trash collection, and basic telephone service. Food stamp households will receive a notice explaining the new procedure by Jan. 15. To find out if they qualify for a lower food stamp purchase price, households should contact their local food stamp office and ask to have their case reviewed.
