Broyhill continued, "I look forward to continuing to seek solutions to the problems which confront our nation, particularly as they relate to the economy. The textile import situation is of prime concern to me, and I will continue to work to seek solutions to this complex problem. Recognized by his colleagues as one of the most effective members of Congress Broyhill currently serves as vice chairman of both the Informal House Committee and Congressional Rural Caucus. He also


