"I didn't even know what gender the baby was until Linda or Lee Ann said it was a boy," he said. "I was concerned with the baby's health. We didn't have any kind of a suction, so I took the mucus out of his mouth with my finger."

"I wasn't nervous," Terry said. "I was anxious for the baby and wanted to make sure he was breathing.'

"It was more of a conversing act when we felt the baby," Sandy said. "We wanted confirmation from ourselves and Linda. Afterward, we felt we were

Mrs. Martha H. Wright of Grover recently completed her year as President of the North Carolina School Food Service Association.

"The best word to describe this year would be 'busy'," Mrs. Wright said. As president of the organization, her responsibilities included developing programs and leadership seminars in the areas of food preparation, sanitation and safety, among others. After only a few short hours in isolation at the hospital, Cristan Lee was in the room with his mother, and everything was perfect.

"The doctors said we did real

good," Sandy said. "There was nothing negative said about it. They said we did a good job' under the circumstances."

"Everybody said we had a lot of guts," Terry added. "I don't think it was that. It was just the circumstances."

"I don't guess it will be necessary for us to run a birth announcement in the paper now, will it," Sandy asked.
