building program. The new roof would be of wood truss/shingle and would cost \$9,000. The improved covered brick arcade and entrance would cost \$5,000 and the 25 feet by 25 feet storage addition was estimated to cost \$12,509. The Board decided to add a new brick veneer on the north and south walls of the existing building and to add new concrete walk/entrance at the front of the existing building.

During a budget work session, the Mayor pointed out that a tentative budget lists \$158,048 in the general fund, \$37,464 in the utilities (water) fund and \$56,419 in the sewer fund. McCarter said there will be no increase in taxes, that the 33 cents per \$100 valuation tax rate will remain the same under the proposed budget.

McCarter reported that about one fourth of the rightsof-way have been purchased for the town's new sewer system at a total cost of \$7,855. He estimated that the rights-of-way will cost ap-proximately \$50,000 when completed.

Replying to question of former commissioner Harold Herndon, McCarter said the town had "no plans at the moment to extend water outside the city limits." Herndon said that persons living in the city limits who need streets and water pay Grover taxes and should be considered before "outsiders."

The Board approved \$4,000 in capital outlay funds for the Grover Fire Department and said work would begin immediately on remodeling of the kitchen in the fire department. The Board also approv-ed payment of \$7500 to Shelby appraiser Ralph Gilbert who appraised 65 parcels for sewer system right-of-way; \$643.71 to Randle Brothers for grading and culverts in Spring Acres; \$1200 for food for the Town Birthday celebra-tion and \$778 for a D5 tapping machine, which includes a 3/4 inch bit and drill holder.
