We are very sorry to hear of the death of Mr. Jessie Miller.

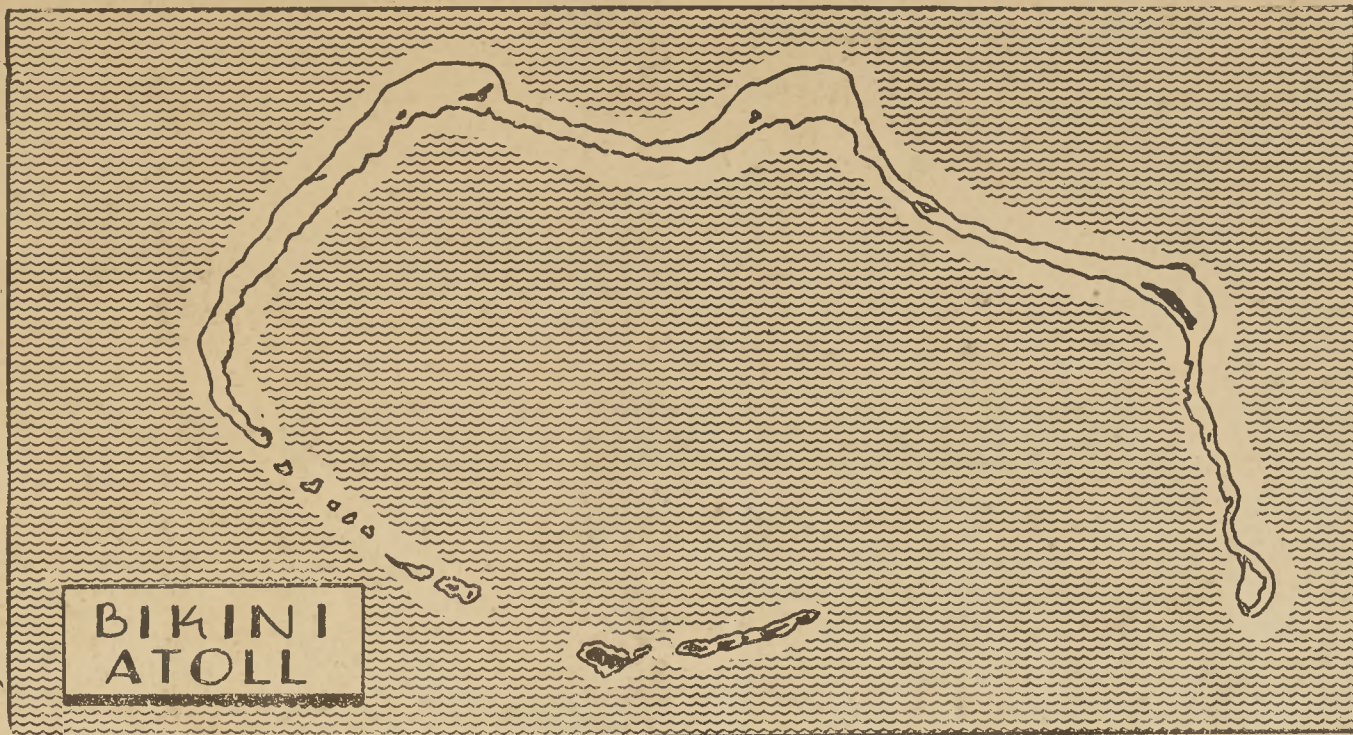

BIKINI ATOLL SELECTED AS LOCATION FOR ATOM BOMB TESTS



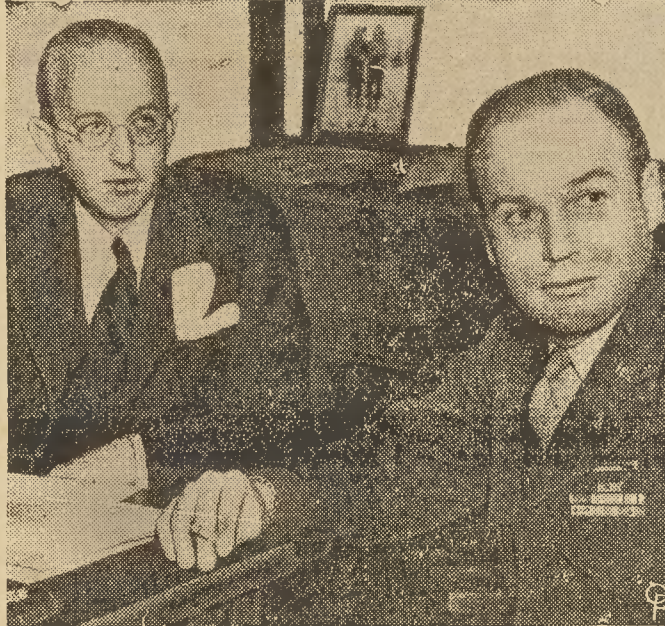
