IS FIRST NEGRO BOY TO WIN IN SOAP BOX DERBY

Derby Is Among The Outstanding Sporting Event Among Boys Of U. S.

Harold Hayes of Durham, crossed the finish line ahead of all other contenders Sunday, July 28, and thereby won the soap box derby, which is the outstanding sport event among boys in the United States.


He therefore won the right to represent Durham in the National Meet in Akron, Ohio, August 18. According to information coming from national headquarters H'arold is the first Negro to ever win the derby race and thereby win the right to represent a city in the All-American Derby. He won over six Negro boys and 37 white boys.

Harold left Durham August 15, in company with the Burthay Brothers, his sponsors. The Herald-Sun and Carpenter's Motor will bear the expenses. He also received a trophy, a gold watch, and \$25.00.






