high inflation rate and cost of living has prohibited citizens from rebuilding businesses in the downtown area.

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Mayor Moss praised the committee for "courage in the early stages of redevelopment."

McGinnis also said he was "disappointed by the snaggle-tooth look in the business district" and Mayor Moss said he felt the new UDAG program will fill the void and will make cash available to rebuilders in the business district in the 80's. He also projected that a new program of private housing will give a boost to the economy and provide much-needed housing and local means of financing it to area citizens.
