Then Conquer We Must Officials Pray For Rain

Drama officials were praying for bright sunshine Monday morning following successful opening nights on Friday and Saturday of the historical outdoor drama, "Then Conquer We Must".

Rain started falling in torrents Sunday afternoon and washed out the scheduled Sunday night performance, not only to the disappointment of those who had purchased tickets but to the sponsoring officials, Limestone College, the City of Kings Mountain and the National Park Service.

Citizens with tickets for Sunday night may use the tickets at other performances Friday, Saturday, Sunday, Monday and Wednesday, the extra performance slated as a makeup date, or on Thursday night, a pickup rehearsal which will be videotaped for educational television. General admission and reserved tickets are on sale at the KM Chamber of Commerce (in the old City Hall) and the Economic Development Office in the new City Hall. The tickets for the Oct. 7th show are \$4 for general admission and \$5

for reserved seats.

Mrs. Lucille Williams, secretary to the Chamber of Commerce, reported a sellout on Friday and Saturday nights and encourages citizens to obtain their tickets early, particularly for the Oct. 7th show which is expected to draw a large number of dignitaries here for the Celebration activities.

Tickets are \$2.50, general admission, and \$3.50 for reserved seats for all performances except Oct. 7th when tickets are \$4, general admission, and \$5, reserved seats.

Drama officials were highly pleased with the opening night crowds and with audience reaction to the drama which was written by the late Bob Osborne and presented by the KM Little Theatre 29 years ago and revised for this performance by newspaperman Thomas McIntyre of Gastonia. Director Charles Hannum of Limestone College and Producer Bill Briggs, a KM native and Limestone President, and members of the large cast have received high praise for their work in recent reviews following opening night.

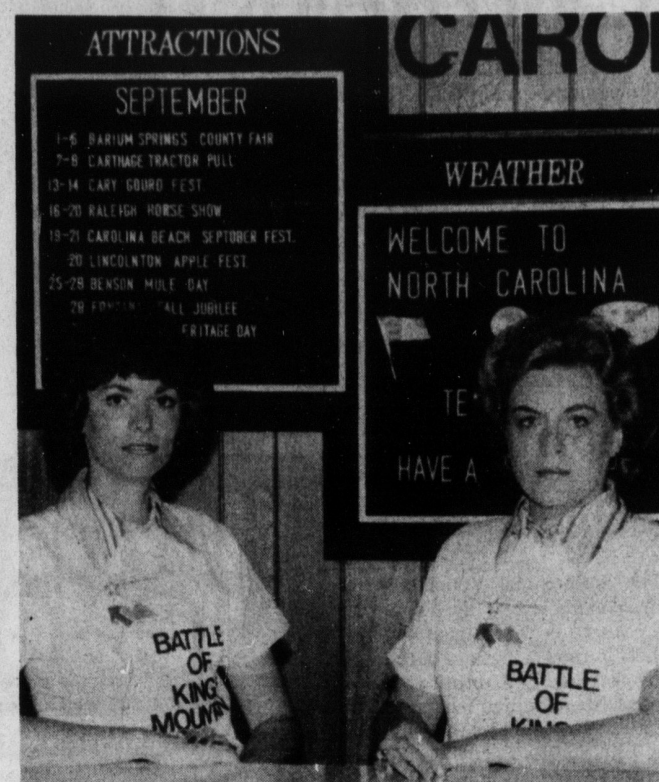
