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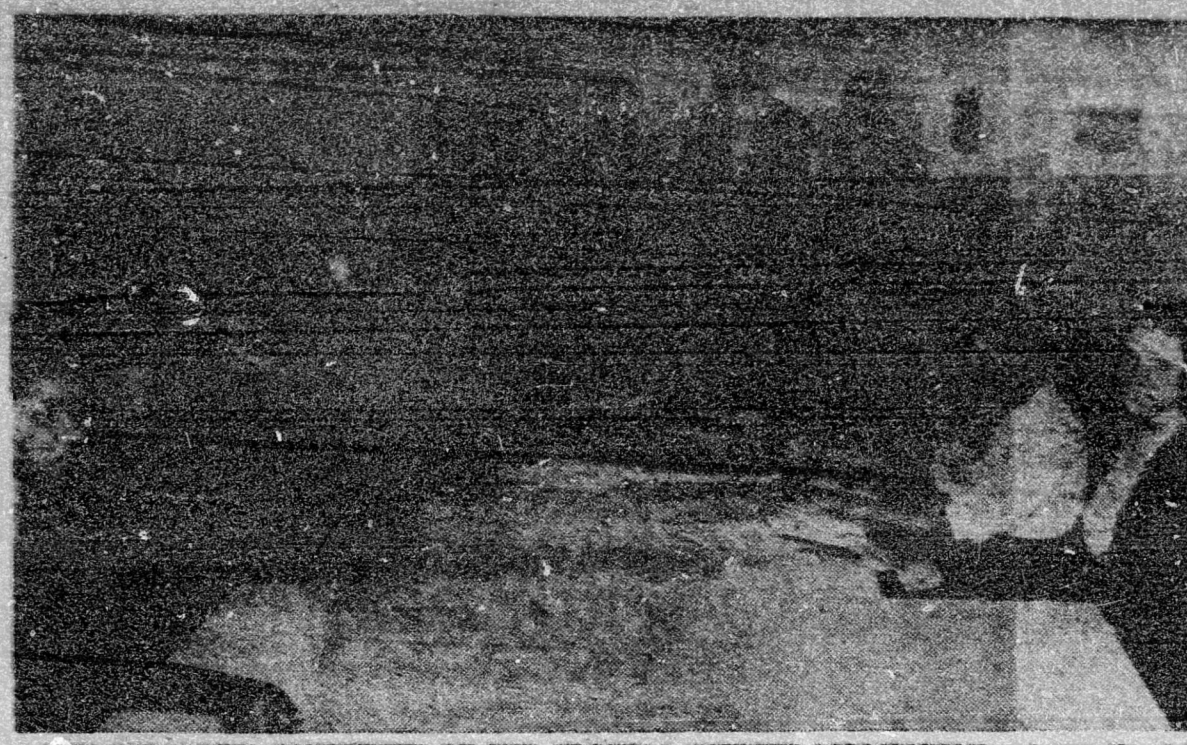

More Than 1,200 Bright Prep School Seniors Seek Scholarships At A&T

GREENSBORO—More than 1200 bright high school seniors from throughout North Carolina and border points in Virginia are in competition for several scholarships being offered by A&T College to freshman students to enter this fall.

The scholarships being made available by the A&T College Alumni Association, the Smith-Douglas Company, the Kroger and Sears Roebuck Foundations are to be awarded on the basis of high scores turned in by the youths on a college entrance examination administered during the last two weeks.

The examinations, sponsored by the alumni group, were given in 27 centers scattered conveniently about the State and at Norfolk, Va. Dr. P. Williams, dean of the A&T Graduate School and chairman of the Alumni Testing Program, stated that the largest number of students in the four year history of the program are in competition.

A total of 1275 students, ranking in the upper fourth of their classes took the tests. He said that the winners would be announced just as soon as the scores have been tabulated.

The top prize include four—\$1,000 scholarships being given each year by the Alumni Association and 10 or 15 smaller grants coming from individuals and corporations.

Leaders Plan "Negro Exposition;" Will Be Most Outstanding Exhibit

CHICAGO (AP)—One of the most outstanding exhibits of progress by Negroes in business and culture ever assembled, will be presented at the Coliseum, May 14 through 17.

Called "The Exposition of the Negro in Business and Culture," the four day show will be sponsored by the New Crusader, Chicago weekly paper. Spread over 40,000 feet of floor space, it will feature a Hall of Fame in which outstanding persons and events in Negro history will be memorialized.

"HALL OF FAME" A FEATURE A corps of Negro history specialists and artists has been commissioned to complete the Hall of Fame, Leavell said.

A panel of leading Chicagoans comprise the exposition committee. Among them are: Truman K. Gibson, Sr., board chairman, Supreme Liberty Life Insurance Co.; T. P. Harris, president, Chicago Metropolitan Mutual Assurance Co.; John H. Johnson, president, Johnson Publications; Siste Sen. Marshall Kurshak; Judge I. Parker, president, Parker House Sausage Co.; Mrs. Joan Dago, Midwest Regional Director, Council of Negro Women; and Claude A. Barnett, director, Associated Negro Press.

According to Balm L. Leavell, Jr., exposition director, the show will include exhibits of 200 business either owned and operated by Negroes or which are outstanding in their relations with the Negro community. Leavell is co-publisher of the Crusader.

He termed the exposition the most important showing of Negro progress since 1940. In keeping with the theme of progress in business, one of the dominant exhibits in the Hall of Fame will honor Jean DuSable, a Negro, who settled what is now Chicago, in 1770, and built up the third largest "Du Sable was a successful busi-

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
