

Newsman T. W. Young Resigns As Consultant On Rights Commission

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Thomas Young has resigned his position as consultant for the President's Commission on Civil Rights to return to his duties as president and general manager of the Norfolk Journal and Guide.

He came to the Commission on June 18, 1958, where he served both as consultant and acting information officer. On January 1, he began part time duties working only three days per week.

In asking to be relieved of his duties, Young said the demand of his publishing business has become so "pressing" that it requires his full time attention.

In accepting his resignation, Gordon M. Tiffany, Staff Director of the Commission, said, "Young has made a valuable and lasting contribution to the effectiveness of our work." He pointed out that the well known newspaper man "won respect and deep affection of the entire staff."

Today about 17 minutes of working time will buy a dozen eggs, compared to 49 years ago when it took 67 minutes.

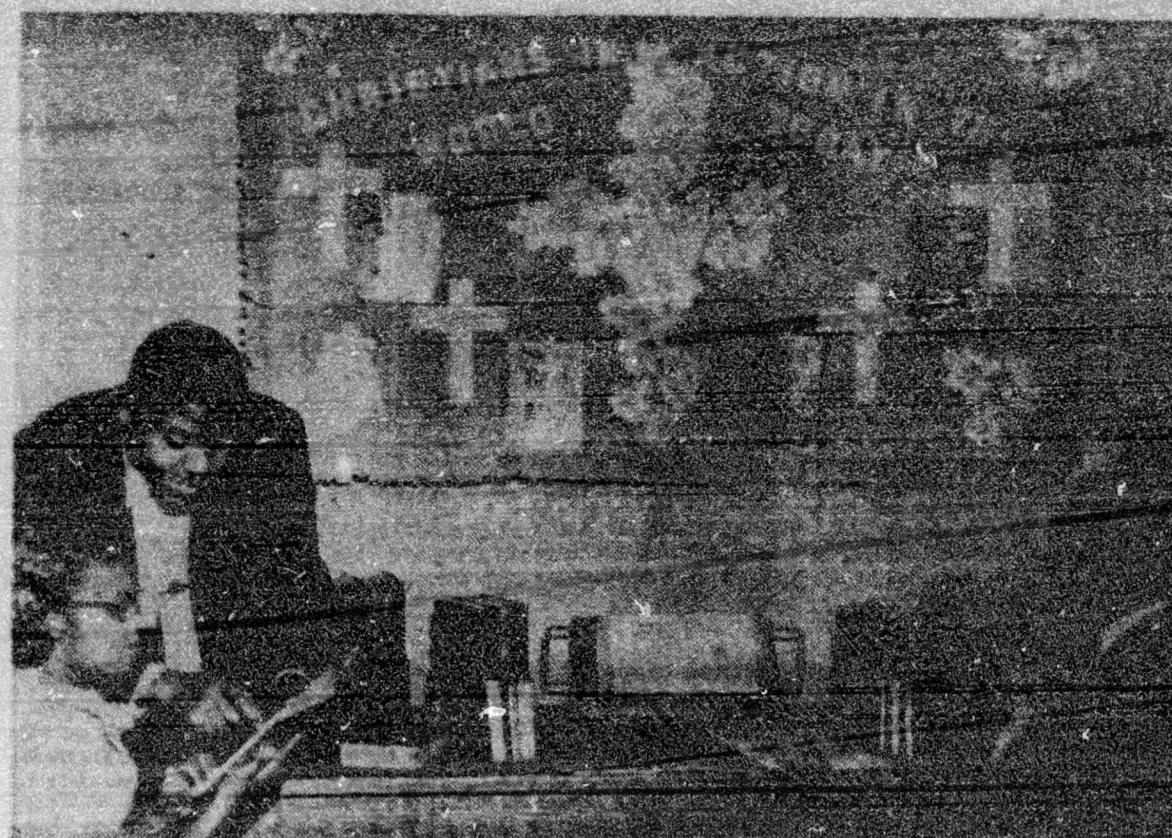

"Missile And Cross" Theme Of NCC Week

DURHAM — "The Missile and The Cross" is the theme of North Carolina College's Religious Emphasis Week, March 22-25.

Dr. James Kelley, Jr., dean of men and professor of philosophy at West Virginia State College, will be the observance's keynote speaker.

Three speeches have been scheduled for Dean Kelley: at 8:15 in Duke Auditorium for a vesper service on March 22; at 10:30 a. m. on Monday, March 23, in an assembly for upper-classmen; and at 10:30 a. m. on March 23, in a freshmen's assembly. He will also visit dormitories and class groups by arrangement with the sponsoring Religious Activities Committee.

The speaker has had more than 20 years pastoral and religious education experience. For the past 10 years he has been pastor of the Samaritan Baptist Church at Institute, W. Va. He served in 1956 as president of the West Virginia Philosophical Society.

Dean Kelly received his training at Gordon College, Boston, Mass.; Eastern Nazarene College, Woburn, Mass.; the School of Religion and the Graduate School at Howard University, and at Harvard University.
