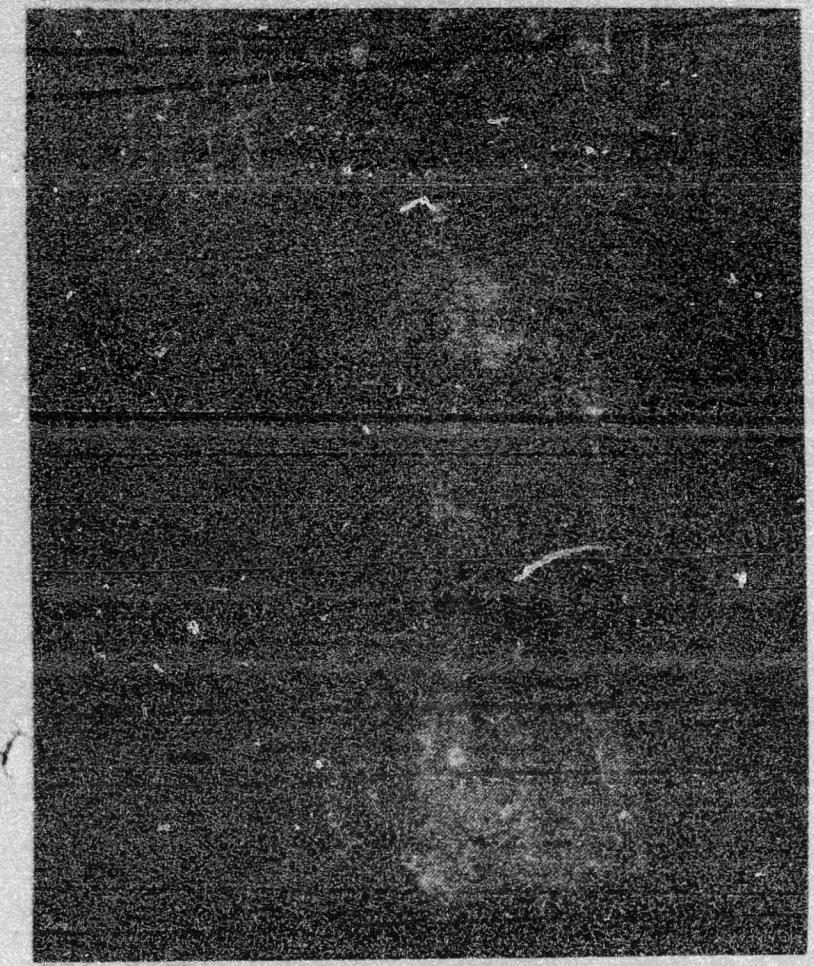


# Miss Jessie Ridley, Charlotte Postal Employee, Wed In Quiet Ceremony Here
