GREENSBORO — Miss Jamesena Chalmers, of Fayetteville, a senior English major at Bennett College, was notified this week that she is among 1,200 superior American and Canadian students who have been named Woodrow Wilson Fellows for the academic year 1959-60.

 This year's fellows were chosen from 7,000 candidates, all nominated and all rigorously screened by committees of faculty members. These candidates came from over 700 undergraduate colleges. Each fellow receives a living allowance of \$1,500, plus the full cost of tuition and fees.

Miss Chalmers, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Chalmers of 1419 Murchison Road, Fayetteville, was salutatorian at the E. K. Smith High School. At Bennett she has been consistently on the honor roll and for the second semester of last year and the first semester of this year established a straight "A" scholastic average.

In addition to being president of the Student Senate, Miss Chalmers is a member of the choir and of Alpha Kappa Mu, national honor society and was selected for Who's Who Among American Universities and Colleges.

53,000 More Persons At Work On Farms In South Than Year Ago

An estimated 53,000 more persons were at work on farms in the South during the survey week of February 15-21 than in the same period a year ago, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports.

Accounting for the increase were preparation for spring planting throughout most of the South, planting or tending tobacco plant beds in the Carolinas, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, and West Virginia, and potato planting in southern Alabama.

The largest increase in employment was shown in North Carolina where 27,000 more persons were at work. Texas was second with an increase of 12,000 over a year ago.
