guilty; it assumes a women guilty until she proves herself innocent. (7) The cost for administering this bill will be just as great or greater than the present cost of welfare payments to mothers of illegitimate children.

Arguments in favor of the bill

1. Unless the problem of illegilimacy is checked, a number of disadvantaged citizens will be born. 2. The bill does not take from the woman the right of appeal to the courts.

3. It will serve as a deterent against "negligent sexual delinquency It will reduce the financial bur-

den now borne by the state checks to unwed mothers.

Rev. Robert L. Shirley, gaster of Raleigh's Davie Street Presbyterian Church, in behalf of the Ministerial Association, pointed out a series of technical inadequacies in the phrasing of the bill. The question of what would hap-

pen if an out-of-state unwed mother brought more than two illegitimate children into the state was the fact that investigation by case workers would be unsound, since it is presumed that the unwed mo-

thers need psychiatric treatment. To leave the matter totally up to the Eutenic Board, without the people being represented, would be undemocratic, said Rev. Shirley. Representing the Colored Women's Federated Clubs was Mrs. D. M. Phelps who stated that this organization has been interested in


ponent of the bill cited statistics showing that around 20 per cent of the persons involved in crime comes from homes of illegitimate mothers. She added that 39 per cent of all inmates in our reformatories for youth were illegitimate children

The Wake County Commissioners sent a representative who stated that the Commissioners were in favor of the bill. It was revealed that Wake County has an unusual financial load in suporting mothers with illegitimate children - a total

of 639 children. Dr. Davis was called to the microphone again to give the findings of her inqury of the 100 boards of county commissioners in North Carolina. She stated that out of the 100 board, eight had no comment to make: four were not sure as to what position they should take:

77 boards endorsed the bill. North Carolina has, for other reasons in the past, through the recommendation of State Tugenics Board sterilized persons on the grounds of feeble-mindedness, epilepsy, and mental illness. For instance, in 1955. 289 such individuals were


