

Pan American Day At Ligon

The 69th anniversary of Pan American Day and National Library Week were observed at Ligon High School April 14th in a combined assembly program given by grade 7-1 history and 8th grade Spanish classes with a few guests participa-

The purpose of Library Week was given by Mrs. R. B. Hamlin, child consultant of the Richard B. Harrison Library, who spoke on the theme of the week, "Wake Up And Read" and displayed several new books on the countries of the Pan American Union. She was introduced by Patricia Marshall.

A panarama, "Greetings from Pan America" was presented by the 7th and 8th grade classes with the help of Ann Ransom and Chinita Trotter. Spanish students of the senior high school. Outstanding characteristics and products of each of the 21 republics were presented in Spanish and English with a display of their flags and resources.

The flags were artistically designed by an 8th grader, Robert Brown and completed by the 7th grade class members. Comments made by the representatives of each republic emphasized some of the goals of the O.A.S. charter namely, "To promote, by cooperation action their economic, social, and cultural development."

Special features of the panarama included the presentation of Senorita Berta Maza Socarras of Cuba who lectured on the resources of her country. 
