





How the quality of rural family ! living has been improved will be the principal topic of discussion by 7 million homemakers during National Home Demonstration

partment of Agriculture. Although rural home improvement among low-income families is not moving ahead at a rapid pace, many of these families also have much to celebrate, say officials of the Cooperative Extension Service. More than 4,000 Extension home demonstration agents work with low-income as well as other families, providing them with home economics research information from the Department of Agricul-

ture, the land-grant colleges and

experiment stations.

Among these Extension workers are about 450 Negro home agents who conduct a year-round educational program with close to a half a million colored homemakers, Achievements of these homemakers and their families include: Improved family relations, some home construction and modernization, better methods of food production and preservation, more nutritious family meals, and better home furnishings and equipment.

Money for the basic improve ments-such as home construction -come from better farming methods, a variety of farm enterprises which provide year-round income part-time off-farm employment and through credit aid from USDA's Farmers Home Administration which made or insured housing loans for 7,450 white and colored families last year.

While some homemakers will be showing off their new homes during National Home Demonstration Week, others will be showing neighbors their new kitchen cabi nets, a reupholstered chair, a new kitchen sink with hot and cold running water, a home freezer, rows of jars of home canning, or a new dress made for a daughter's graduation from high school. 
