ness." This offering was blessed by Deacon Holloway. The announcements of the week and the introduction of the visitors





Deep South


The story of a Southern Negro. who crossed the color line and lived as a white man in Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi, is told in the June issue of EBONY Magazine. In a first person article called, "Why I Never Want To Pass," the author, who is anonymous, disclosed that he passed for people, feared them and despised

The author conducted his experiment during a two week period that began in Washington. D. C. Among the first things he leanred was the belief that one Negro can tell another is a fallacy. He also discovered that passing is not so much a matter of features and complexion, but of attitude.

I learned to talk to clerks and waitresses as though I was demanding service, was used to it, and I knew I would get it," he says in EBONY. "I looked them in the eye and said in a firm, no-nonsense voice, 'I want this-I want that.'
